STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in the Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the 8th day of March nexe, at eleven of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose one person for three years as Selectman of said town, one person for three years as Trustee of Trust Funds, one person for three years as Trustee of the Public Library, two persons for three years as Trustees of Cemeteries, and to choose all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount necessary for the maintenance of State Aid shighways, as recommended by the State Highway Commissioner.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount necessary to acquire State Aid for the construction and permanent improvement of highway of the construction.

5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart for town maintenance of highways and bridges.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$800.00 for snow removal, or take any other action relating thereto.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for White Pine Blister Rust control, to be expended in co-operation with the State Forestry department.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police department for the ensuing year,

- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$240.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise as aid for the town poor for the ensuing year and make appropriation therefor. 7 ? ? .
- 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.
- 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for cemeteries for the ensuing year and make appropriation therefor,
- 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day. 36,
- 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise, and appropriate to pay on the town debt.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to elect an advisory financial committee to act in conjunction with the selectmen in preparation of the budget, and also in regard to other financial matters concerning the town including salaries and wages of town officers and employees, and if voted in the affirmative, to proceed to elect three persons who shall serve in this capacity for one year without pay.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

- 19. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their annual appraisal in April.



AUDITORS' REPORT

We, the undersigned auditors of the Town of Pelham, certify that we have examined the books of the selectmen, treasurer, tax collector, town clerk, treasurer of trust funds, and treasurer of cemetery trustees. We find the selectmen have issued orders on the treasurer to the amount of \$51,899.24 and said orders were properly receipted. That the treasurer has received from various sources \$53,319.05 and has paid the above mentioned orders, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$1,419.81. The collector has \$6,234.01 of the 1931 taxes to collect. The town clerk has paid the treasurer \$1,120.33 for auto permits of which \$379.99 is for 1931 permits and \$740.34 is for 1932 permits. He has paid the treasurer \$285.90 for dog licenses.

The treasurer of the trust funds has a balance on hand of \$819.04. The treasurer of the cemetery trustees has a balance of \$17.49 on hand.

The total amount of trust funds is \$8,142.50.



There were three changes in the teachers in Pelham this year. Mr. Robert Googins of the University of New Hampshire is taking the place of Mrs. Ruth Richardson as Headmaster of the Junior High School, Miss Evelyn Philbrick of Lowell Normal, the place of Miss Elizabeth Bannigan in the Center School, and Miss Helen Broderick of Keene Normal School the place of Miss Alice Whitman at North Pelham.

Several changes were made in the curriculum at the Iunior High School. It is believed that the additional subjects will better prepare the pupils to deal with the problems of life.

French was eliminated from Grade 7, but was continued as an elective in Grade 8 for this year, so as not to create any injustice for those boys and girls who started French last year. Next year French will not be taught in either Grades 7 or 8.

Instruction in Health, Safety Education, and General Sci-

ence is now being given in these grades.

Due to the small number of pupils in Grades 9 and 10, these grades are combined for the most of their work each year. A study of the courses offered in these grades revealed the fact that one-half of the time was being spent on French and Ancient and Medieval History.

In order to offer better educational advantages to each boy and girl, the curriculum has been completely revised so that this

1227

year grades 9 and 10 are taking English, General Science, American Principles, and either Junior Business Training or French, the 9th grade having French 9, and the 10th Grade French 10.

Next year Grades 9 and 10 will again be combined and will take English, History of Civilization, Algebra or General Mathematics, and will have a choice of one of the following: Economics and Commercial Geography, French 9 or French 10.

In the school year 1933-34, the same curriculum will be fol-

lowed which is being followed this year.

By thus combining the most of the subjects in these grades, it is possible in two years for each boy and girl to have studied each subject, although that subject, with the exception of French, has been taught but once.

Conferences have been held between the Junior High teachers and each of the elementary teachers in the hope that a closer correlation in the work between the sixth and seventh grades may be effected.

The parent-teachers' organizations at North Pelham and Gumpus school are to be congratulated upon their interest in the

welfare of these schools.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER

Pelham, N. H., Feb. 17, 1932.

To Mr. Fred W. Hall, Superintendent of Schools, the Pelham School Board, and Citizens of Pelham, N. H.:

Herewith is submitted, with pleasure, my first annual report of the activities of Pelham High School.

At the beginning of the school year the enrollment was thirteen; six pupils in Grade IX, and seven pupils in Grade X.

The curriculum for the year 1931-32 is as follows:

English II	40 min. per., 5 days per week
French IX-X (elective)	40 min. per., 5 days per week
Jr. Bus. Training (elective)	40 min. per., 5 days per week
American Life	40 min. per., 5 days per week
General Science	40 min, per., 5 days per week
Fundamentals	20 min. per., 3 days per week

A new social science course, American Life, has been added this year, and should prove of inestimable value to all young Americans in the impressionable high school age.

The attendance this year has been remarkably good, and tardinesses are minimal, thus greatly helping the standing of our school in terms of state standards.

The annual visit of Mr. Leavitt, State Secondary School inspector, came early in the fall, and his report on the condition of the building, grounds, and on the attitude of the pupils was particularly favorable.

The school nurse has given constant supervision of pupil health, and doubtless the physical condition of the pupils may be attributed in large part to her efforts.

Money has been raised by selling Crowell Publications, and

a school play is now under way.

Our athletic and social progress has been promising. Baseball, soccer and boxing have been enjoyed, and we are planning an organized baseball team in the spring. The school has Literary, Debating, Outdoor, and Bird clubs. Frequent assemblies have been held in charge of student committees.

The school library, comprising over 125 volumes, has been

catalogued and is in constant use by the pupils.

The school building was extensively renovated the past summer, and electric lights were installed. This is a great asset both to pupils and townspeople.



The teachers of the High School wish to thank all those who have contributed current publications to our school library. We particularly wish to thank Supt. of Schools Hall for his help and thoughtful suggestions; the School Board for their support; and the citizens of Pelham for their interest in our work.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the School Board and Citizens of Pelham I hereby submit my report:

The health of the pupils in all schools was very good during the year and the cleanliness and general appearance of the children seems improved. There were two cases of scarlet fever in one school but they were detected early and properly isolated.

The school janitors and housekeepers seem to take pride in their work and the school property has been kept clean and in order

A start was made by the children toward improving the school grounds and I am sure that with the encouragement of adults in the various school districts the grounds could be made attractive and the appearance of the town thereby improved.

During the year your nurse gave 63 talks to the children in the schools on matters pertaining to health, traveled 809 miles and was on duty 351 hours.

There are a large number of children that have defects

that should be corrected to insure their good health.

The State is prepared to give preventive treatment against diphtheria for a very small fee. A child can be protected against diphtheria probably for life by the use of this treatment.
