You are hereby notified to meet at Pilgrim Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.

13 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

14 To see if the Town will vote to build a Town Hall building, and if vote in the affirmative to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the

same. Also to choose agents or Committees to carry the same into effect, or take any other action relating thereto.

15 To see if the Town will vote to select three men for the appraises of real estate for the year ensuing.
