To the inhabitants of the Town of Pelham qualified to vote  
in Town affairs

You are hereby notified to meet at Pilgrim Hall in said  
Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of  
the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year  
ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary  
to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make  
appropriations of the same.

3 To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate  
and set apart the amount of money necessary to secure  
State aid for permanent improvement for Highways, under  
the law passed at January Session 1905.

4 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise

for the repair of Highways and Bridges for the year ensuing and make appropriations for the same. And to determine in what manner the same shall be expended.

5 To see what disposition the Town will make of the Dog Fund for the ensuing year.

6 To see what disposition the Town will make of the Library Fund for the year ensuing.

7 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the extermination of Gypsy and Brown-tail Moths, and take any other action in relation thereto.

8 To choose two persons for Trustees of Cemeteries for three years, one for two years.

9 To choose one person for Trustee of Public Library for three years.

10 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.

11 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Cemeteries for the ensuing year.

12 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for School purposes for the year ensuing.

13 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

14 To see if the Town will vote to build a Town Hall building, and if vote in the affirmative to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the

same. Also to choose agents or Committees to carry the same into effect, or take any other action relating thereto.

15 To see if the Town will vote to select three men for the appraisals of real estate for the year ensuing.

16 To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent on Tax list of 1910 paid on or before Sept. 1st 1910.

17 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

- 2 To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years, also one for two years.
- 4 To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5 To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6 To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 7 To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of Schools, including the amount for tuition of pupils attending high schools or academies.
- 8 To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for text-books and supplies for the ensuing year.

9 To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for the repair of school houses for the ensuing year.

10 To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and truant officer or officers, and District Clerk and all other District officers.

11 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
