TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham, in the County of Hillsborough in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Pelham, on Tuesday the 14th day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same 22.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount necessary to acquire State Aid for the construction and permanent improvement of highways.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart for Town maintenance of highways and bridges.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate \$800 for snow removal or take any other action relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$3333 this year and a like sum next year on condition that the State contribute \$6667 each of the two years mentioned for permanent improvement of the Mammoth road, so-called, as provided in an Act now before the Legislature. The same to apply to such portion of said Mammoth road now unimproved, or to take any other action relative thereto.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department for the ensuing year.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department for the ensuing year.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$240 for street lighting for the ensuing year or take any other action relative thereto.
- 10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the aid of the Town poor for the ensuing year.

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- 11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.
- 12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries for the ensuing year.
- 13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on the Town debt.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to release for the sum of \$150, the same to be used as a Trust Fund for the perpetual care of the Lyon part of the Lyon-Coburn Cemetery, whatever interest it may have in the Sarah C. Lyon homestead (commonly known as "Stone Cottage") under Article Fifth of the will of said Sarah C. Lyon, and authorize the selectmen to execute and deliver to Mary A. Lyon, the present owner thereof, upon receipt of said sum a deed of all the Town's right, title and interest therein.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10 for clearing disputed titles on properties recorded at County Registry.
- 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax collector's deed.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase an adding machine and typewriter for use of the Town officers.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 3 per cent on 1933 tax list paid on or before June 1, 1933, 2 per cent if paid on or before August 1, 1933, 1 per cent if paid on or before October 1, 1933.
- 21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their annual appraisal in April.

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22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

AUDITORS' REPORT

We, the undersigned auditors of the town of Pelham, certify that we have examined the books of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Treasurer of Trust Funds, and Treasurer of Cemetery Trustees. We find the Selectmen have issued orders on the Treasurer to the amount of \$42,222.13, and said orders were properly receipted. That the Treasurer has received from various sources \$45,024.93, and has paid the above mentioned orders, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$2,802.80. The collector has \$4,772.10 of the 1932 taxes to collect. The Town Clerk has paid the Treasurer \$939.14 for auto permits of which \$230.76 is for 1932 permits and \$708.38 is for 1933 permits. He has paid the treasurer \$306.60 for dog licenses. The Treasurer of the Trust Funds has a balance on hand of \$813.21 and accumulated interest on same of \$76.91, making a total of \$890.12. The total amount of trust funds is \$8,192.50. The treasurer of the Cemetery Trustees has a balance of \$7.91 on hand.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER

Pelham, N. H., February 9, 1933

To Superintendent Fred W. Hall. the Pelham School Board, and Citizens of Pelham, N. H.:

With pleasure I herewith submit the annual report of Pelham High School.

The present year opened with an enrollment of fifteen, a slight increase over last year's registration. At present there are four pupils in grade X and ten pupils in grade IX.

The curriculum for the school year 1932-33 is as follows:

English II	40 min. per., 5 days per week
French IX-X (elective)	40 min. per., 5 days per week
Algebra	40 min. per., 5 days per week
History of Civilization	40 min. per., 5 days per week
Com. History and Geography	
(elective)	40 min. per., 5 days per week
Fundamentals	20 min. per., 3 days per week

Commercial History and Geography, a valuable adjunct to any general high school course, is offered this year, and algebra is offered in place of its alternate, Junior Business Training. The social science group is represented by History of Civilization, which comprises a general survey of the whole western historical field with the aim of creating an analyatical historical perspective.

With the exception of absences due to sickness, attendance this year has been good. As usual, tardiness is very rare.

The school nurse has given us her usual helpful health supervision.

School organizations this year include Literary, Boat, Athletic, and Variety, (Art, photography, etc.) clubs. The annual school play is planned for early spring.

Your principal has been to many homes this year, and plans to have visited every parent before the close of school in June. The visits with you have been both helpful and pleasant, and I

feel that they cannot help but be of great benefit and reflect in greater understanding and progress for your children.

The teachers of the High School wish to thank Superintendent Hall for his helpful and sympathetic administration; the school board for their co-operative support; and the citizens of Pelham for their continued interest and co-operation.

To the School Board and Citizens of the Town of Pelham:

Following is my report as school nurse for the school year 1931-1932:

On October 15, 1931, a clinic for underweight children was conducted and Dr. Luther March examined 109 children. Many parents were present and talked with the doctor. Your school nurse visited the homes of all children found to have defects. As a result of this clinic many defects were discovered, and the proper remedies for correction were attended to by the parents.

In April, the hearing of all children above the first grade, who were in school on the day the test was given was tested with the Audiometer.

Scarlet fever appeared in one of our schools on two occasions. After each out-break, your nurse visited the school daily for a period of two weeks and examined all children present.

During the year, your nurse talked with the school children 75 times on matters pertaining to health and prevention of disease.
