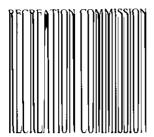

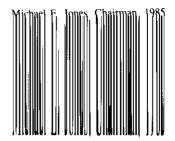

BOARD OF SELECTMEN 1983 ANNUAL REPORT

Town departments operated within the total Town budget for the fourth time since 1970. The assessment for Hillsborough County was \$317,550.00, while reimbursements from the State were \$219,478.00. The total Town appropriations were \$1,747,135.00. Total spending plus Warrant Articles total \$1,678,450.00 for an unaudited surplus of \$68,685.00 for 1983.

This was our first year for semi-annual billing of taxes. The interest expense on temporary loans in 1981 was \$63,400.68 and in 1982 was \$65,424.86, while in 1983 the total expended was \$1,250.00. This coupled with a \$25,000.00 increase in income on investment resulted in a net savings to the taxpayer of more than \$80,000.00.

Significant changes in personnel occurred during 1983. Administrative Assistant Brian McKinley was replaced in September by Dennis McNamara.

Nancy Adrien resigned as Health Officer and was replaced by Cathy Shurtleff on May 31, 1983. Mrs. Shurtleff resigned in January of 1984 and no one has applied to fill this position.

Seven appointees, both men and women, have been added to the Fire Department. Two special police officers were appointed.

Russell Hartley resigned on June 4, 1983 to accept the position of Police Chief in Mason, N.H. Patrolman Richard Young was promoted to Sergeant on August 16, 1983. His vacated patrolman's position was not filled until January of 1984.

The TRS-80 - Zenix - system computer came in late September. It was up and running by the end of the year. Courses of instruction for town employees are scheduled for sometime in February, 1984. Direct line hookup to the Police Department will also be completed in 1984.

The Board will continue to run the town in a cost effective manner. These are but a few issues with which the Board dealt in the year 1983. We wish to thank all Department Heads, Employees, and those individuals serving on Town Boards, Committees & Commissions who have made this such a successful year.

The Board wishes to thank the residents for their continued support and we look forward to working with and serving you.

REPORT OF THE PELHAM ASSESSOR

To the Board of Selectmen and Pelham Residents:

It is with pleasure that I submit the first Pelham Assessor's report.

1983 was a very active, rewarding year for your Assessor.

With a total of 3,241 properties accounted for, the gross taxable value of property in Pelham for 1983 is \$200,853,670, an increase of \$3,001,980 over 1982.

Due to the 1982 revaluation of the Town, a good deal of time was spent processing abatement requests and correcting any errors found in the listing and/or computations on the assessment cards. Thanks to the help and cooperation of the Board of Selectmen, of the 516 abatements and corrections acted on, all but 30 were settled at the local level.

An additional 49 parcels of land were approved for current use assessment in 1983. We now have 206 parcels of land consisting of a total of 5,172 acres, assessed in current use.

The Assessor's office was also kept busy processing exemptions for the 1983 tax year. A total of 863 exemptions were granted in the following catagories:

Adjusted Elderly Exemption	123

Wood Heating Exemption	27

All property owners wishing to apply for an exemption or a current use land assessment are reminded to complete an application by April 15, 1984, in order to qualify for the 1984 tax year. If you have any questions regarding this information, please contact the Assessor's Office.

After passing an exam, your Assessor has become one of 37 Assessors in the State of New Hampshire certified by the New Hampshire Association of Assessing Officials.

In closing, my sincere thanks to the Board of Selectmen and the residents of Pelham, your cooperation, kindness and consideration is truly appreciated.

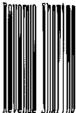

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SECOND SESSION ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MEMORIAL SCHOOL MARCH 19, 1983

The moderator, Philip R. Currier opened the second session of the 1983 Town Meeting at 1:05 P.M. William McDevitt led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. Mr. Currier then recognized all non-registered voters and cautioned them that they were not to take part in the meeting.

ARTICLES 1 through 4 Acted upon at the polls on Election Day.

The moderator explained that we would take up Article 9 first because it was a bond issue. He explained that it requires a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote and must be a secret ballot. The polls would be open for at least one hour.

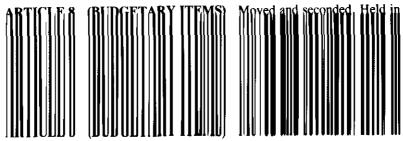
ARTICLE 9 (ADDITION TO THE LIBRARY) (By Petition) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) Moved to adopt the article. Seconded.

Library trustee, Maryann Bennett was the spokesman for the trustees. She described in detail the plans for the building expansion. The new addition would be 46 x 46 with 4268 sq. ft. for both floors. Total cost would be \$347,718.00 plus architect's fees and contingency fees; and renovations to the existing building would be 3342 sq. ft. at a c st of \$28,736.00 with the grand total cost of \$496,918.00. The proposed financing would be principal of \$500,000.00 at an interest rate of 8% for a period of 20 years. The semi-annual principal repayment would be \$12,500.00. The moderator then opened the article discussion. Debate continued for nearly an hour when the question was moved to proceed to a secret ballot. Mr. Currier opened the polls officially at 2:28 P.M. Voting continued for an hour with the polls being closed at 3:39 P.M. The meeting proceeded while the votes were tallied.

ARTICLE 5 (REPORTS OF AUDITORS, AGENTS & OTHER COMMITTEES) Moved and seconded. Passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 6 (PREPAYMENT OF TAXES) Moved and seconded. Passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7 (BORROW IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES) Moved and seconded. Passed in the affirmative.



abeyance till the affirmative.

SERIES 100 (TOWN OFFICER'S SALARIES)

Moved and seconded. Arthur Paradis amended the total figure to \$23,550.00. His intent was to reduce the Selectmens' salaries from \$4100.00 to \$2500.00. Vote on the amended figure failed. Vote on the recommended figure passed in the affirmative. \$25,150.00

SERIES 101 (SELECTMEN'S EXPENSES)

Moved and seconded. John Langan amended the total figure to \$75,500.00. \$2500.00 would be deleted from point I—salaries. A hand count was called on the amended figure—Yes 68 and No 132. The amendment failed. Vote on the original figure passed in the affirmative.

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ARTICLE 10 (PURCHASE MICROFILM READER FOR TOWN HALL) (Recommended by the Budget Committee) Moved and seconded. After much discussion there was a motion to limit debate. Vote on the article passed in the affirmative. \$1,300.00

ARTICLE 9 VOTE ON THE LIBRARY ADDITION At 3:29 the moderator announced that there were 270 votes cast—Yes 81 and No 189. The article failed.

Request to consider Article 34.

ARTICLE 34 (\$150,000.00 TO BE PLACED IN LIBRARY CAPITAL RESERVE FUND) (By Petition) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee) Motion to accept the recommendation of the Budget Committee which would kill Article 34. Seconded. Passed as recommended by the Budget Committee. Article defeated.

ARTICLE 35 (HIRE PART-TIME CLERK OF THE WORKS FOR LIBRARY ADDITION) (By Petition) (Recommended by Budget Committee) Move to pass over. Seconded. Passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 36 (WITHDRAWAL OF \$1500.00 FROM LIBRARY CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR EXPANSION COSTS) (By Petition) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee) Moved to pass over. Seconded. Michael McNamara made a motion to defeat the motion to pass over. He explained that this money would not be raised by taxes. After much discussion the motion to pass over was passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 37 (AUTHORIZE TRUSTEE OF TRUST FUNDS TO ACCEPT GIFTS TO BE PLACED IN LIBRARY CAPTIAL RESERVE FUND) (By Petition) Moved and seconded. Article adopted.

ARTICLE 38 (1983 INCOME FROM LIBRARY UNRESTRICTED TRUST FUNDS PLACED INTO LIBRARY CAPITAL RESERVE FUND) (By Petition) Moved and seconded. Article adopted.

ARTICLE 11 (PURCHASE MICRO/MINI COMPUTER FOR TOWN DEPARTMENTS) (Recommended by Budget Committee) Moved and seconded. John Lavallee explained that the computer would be a TRS 80—Model 16 multi-user desk-top system. It would consist of a basic computer, two terminals, printer and word processing system. The terminals would be at the police department and the incinerator and the computer would be in the Selectmen's office in the town hall. Hal Lynde and Bill Collis were among those who spoke strongly in favor of this purchase. After a lengthy discussion there was a motion to limit debate. Vote on the article required a hand count with the results 99 Yes and 69 No. The article passed in the affirmative. \$9,000.00

ARTICLE 12 (INSTALL SECURITY SYSTEM IN TOWN HALL) (Not recommended by the Budget Committee) Moved and seconded. John Lavallee amended the figure to \$2500.00. Seconded. Bill Collis, Police Chief urged this purchase. He explained that the system was not just a burglary system but also a fire system. Vote on the amended article required a hand count with the results 100 Yes and 44 No. Article passed in the affirmative as amended. \$2,500.00

SERIES 102 (TOWN CLERK)

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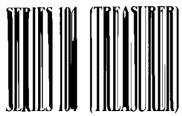
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Moved and seconded. Passed in the affirmative.

SERIES 103 (TAX COLLECTOR)

Moved and seconded. John Lavallee explained that the large increase over last year's budget is due to the fact that the town will be on semi-annual billing for 1983. SPECIAL TOWN MEETING SHERBURNE SCHOOL AUGUST 11, 1983

The meeting was called to order by Moderator, Philip R. Currier at 7:40 P.M. Thomas Kirby led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. Mr. Currier explained that the necessary number of voters had requested a ballot vote on all three warrant articles. Therefore, we would comply with the requests. He explained that there would be no hour wait while the voting proceeded. This was only necessary on a bond issue. Mr. Currier then read the article to be considered.

ARTICLE 1.: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Five Thousand and 00/100 (\$55,000.00)

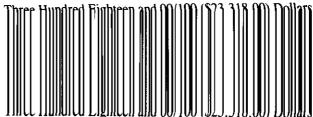
Dollars to purchase the so-called Robinson Property and to add this property, which is described in a deed recorded in Book 2950, Page 546 at the Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds, to the Elmer G. Raymond Memorial Park. (Recommended by Budget Committee).

The article was moved and seconded. William Hayes explained that the entire amount would be re-imbursed in the following manner; \$27,500. shall be re-imbursed from a Land and Water Conservation Fund Grant and \$27,500. shall be re-imbursed from sale of sand, gravel, timber and hardwood located on the Robinson property. This will be completed by July 15, 1985. The first \$32,000. from the sale proceeds shall be paid into the general fund of the Town of Pelham. ARTICLE 2.: To see it the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Forty-Nine Thousand One Hundred Ten and 00/100 (\$49,110.00) Dollars for the purpose of making renovations to the Pelham Public library; further, that to finance this project that the Town raise by taxation the sum of Twenty-Three Thousand

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and that the balance of the cost of the renovations in the amount of Twenty-Five Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety-Two and 00/100 (\$25,792.00) Dollars be funded by a federal grant under the Library Services and Construction Act (Public Law 98-3) which the Selectmen are hereby directed to apply for, accept and expend on behalf of the Town. In no case shall the amount raised by taxation be no more than 0.904 times the amount of the federal funds recieved. (Recommended by Budget Committee).

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The article was moved and seconded. Maryann Bennett, Library Trustee spoke in favor of the article. She asked support of the voters to accept federal funds from the Federal Jobs Bill that was passed on March 24, 1983 after Town Meeting. These are matching funds geared for renovations and handicapped facilities. They must be applied for prior to Sept. 1st. The trustees must have approval of the voters before request can be made. The funds would be expended for a septic system and leach field, handicap access and energy efficiency. The total cost is \$49,110.00, Federal funds would be \$25,792.00 and the amount to be raised by the town would be \$23,318.00. The selectmen would control all expenditures. Mrs. Bennett requested special permission for the Library Director, Maggie Marshall to speak on behalf on the article. No decision. After a lengthy discussion there was a motion to limit debate. Passed. While the ballot vote proceeded, the moderator explained why there were three ballot votes. Prior to the meeting Mr. Currier was given a petition in writing signed by ten voters requesting a secret ballot on all three articles. All that is necessary is five voter signatures. Ballot vote proceeded. Moved to next article.

ARTICLE 3.: To see if the Town will vote to accept a devise of the late Teresa F. Muldoon of fifty-three (53) acres of land located in Pelham, said devise to be accepted upon the terms and condition set forth in the will of the late Teresa F. Muldoon.

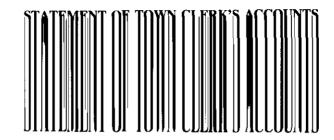
The article was moved and seconded. Denis Finn, Recreational Director spoke in favor of the bequest and explained it could serve many recreational uses. He read the restrictions of Mrs. Muldoon's will including the one that the park be named after her late husband, George M. Muldoon. After many questions from the voters there was a motion to limit debate. Passed. The ballot vote proceeded with the following results: Total votes cast - 166, YES - 142 and NO - 24. The article passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 2. CONTINUED. The moderator read the results of the ballot vote. Total votes cast - 164. YES - 82 and NO - 82. TIE VOTE. Mr. Currier. the moderator explained that he could vote to break the tie. There were many objections stating that he had closed the vote. Philip Healey requested a recount. Paul Johnson challenged the moderator's right to vote after the vote had been closed. The Moderator elected not to cast a vote. Therefore, the article is defeated. Dennis Viger then made a motion to reconsider the action taken on Article 2. Seconded. It was then requested in writing that the motion to reconsider Article 2 be by secret ballot. Accepted. The motion to reconsider the article was taken by hand count. YES - 81 and NO - 80. Katherine Micchichi requested that the Librarian, Maggie Marshall, a nonresident be allowed to speak to the body. William Azimopoulos Jr. challenged allowing a non-resident to speak. Hand vote taken — defeated. Miss Marshall then explained thoroughly the needs of the library. After a lengthy discussion there was a motion to limit debate. Adopted. Ballot vote proceeded with the following results: 171 ballots cast YES - 93 and NO - 78. The article on the revote was adopted. Motion to reconsider article 2 was made by Norman Lawrence. Seconded. Voice vote on the motion was strongly opposed. Article 2 passed in the affirmative.

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PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Planning Board was hampered in its operations at the start of the year by a lack of adequate membership. The pressure of personal affairs brought the resignation of the Chairman and Vice Chairman. Fortunately the economy did not encourage rapid growth. Less than forty (40) new lots were created this year.

We welcomed the fulltime appointment of Joanne Langdon, Paul Johnson, Gertrude Clark and alternate member, William Scanzani. We have reviewed plans for the expansion of several businesses. A new medical office center is completed. A multi-use hardware - office - warehouse complex, a home decorating center and a professional office building are in the development stage. A market complex is anticipated. Hydrological and engineering studies are being conducted in response to an application to establish a solid dump.

Gravel Pit operation is being closely monitored and all owners have been reminded to renew their permits or face legal action. One pit was closed when routine inspection uncovered illegal dumping. We are making every effort to protect our fragile ground water supply.

The youth of Pelham will benefit from the ongoing development of the Elmer G. Raymond Memorial Park with the addition of land and the completion of a large parking area and new activities area.

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Over the years our Zoning, Building, Subdivision, Site Review, Health & Safety ordinances have been modified and amended frequently. The Planning Board is currently involved in "Recodification", i.e., gathering all applicable regulations, collating, printing and producing a booklet form which will be available for sale to developers and others requiring such information. This project has proved to require considerable time and effort; but it will facilitate the compliance with town ordinances.

The Planning Board has perceived the need of additional Business Zoning. Our Master Plan and the Nashua Regional Planning Commission warned against strip zoning of Route 38 to the Salem line as a citizen's petition requested. As a result we are recommending a widening and expansion of the current Business Zones on Route 38 to accommodate mall-type development to add to our tax-base. We are asking for your support of this proposal at Town Meeting.

We also are proposing the appointment of a full time Building Inspector Code Enforcement official. Changes in State regulations now charge the Planning Board with the responsibility for promulgating a Capital Improvement Budget with input from department heads and the Board of Selectmen.

As you can see our responsibilities are many and varied. Each board member has volunteered to work in a special area, e.g. Subdivisions, Gravel Pits, Capital Improvements, etc. This way and with the assistance of our town engineer, H. Tracy David and Planning Consultant Atty. William Hayes, we are looking forward to a busy and productive 1984.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NASHUA REGIONAL



The past year has been one of significant success for the Commission both in representing the interests of the region and in providing direct local assistance to communities within the region.

Regional projects have included the continuation of the Commission's Aquifier Delineation Study which is now into its third and final year. The NRPC convened a regional task force to study and develop a consensus on the region's transportation problems and potential solutions. The Commission was also instrumental in providing a forum through which area municipalities could discuss options available for complying with the State's solid waste law. The result has been the formation of a solid waste district through which future planning for solid waste management can be accomplished. Additionally, the Commission is assisting the Souhegan Regional Landfill District in undertaking a study of cooperative approaches to solve the problems associated with septage disposal within its member towns. The Commission also coordinated a cooperative bid on fuel oil in which five towns participated in the cooperative bid solicitation process.

In the legislative arena, the Commission sponsored a gathering of area legislators to brief them on pressing regional concerns which might be addressed through legislative action. The Commission then continued to provide information to legislators and local officials throughout the most recent biennial session of the legislature. Also, with the passage of the recodified planning and zoning enabling legislation, the Commission assisted local officials in adjusting to the new law by co-sponsoring a law lecture series which addressed the topic, and through periodic mailings and updates.

Local officials and area residents were also kept informed on local regional issues, problems and solutions through the Commission's newsletter SOUNDINGS, and through the Dispatch and Legislation Alert mailings throughout the year.

The Commission has performed a number of projects in the past year which were of direct local benefit. Most notable is the study of Town-owned lands which examined the characteristics of each parcel to determine if each should be actively used, sold or simply held as open space. This comprehensive study was performed under the NRPC's Local Planning Assistance program which allocates free staff time to all dues-paying member communities. The Commission staff also reviewed the traffic and land use impacts of a proposed development at the request of the Pelham Planning Board. A review of potential solutions to problems with the zoning of Route 38 was also provided.

In the area of transportation planning, the Commission has worked with State and local officials on planned improvements to Route 38 and represented the Town's interests in the region's planned highway developments including the proposed Hudson Circumferential Highway.

The Commission looks forward to continued service to its members in the year ahead, and to working with local and state officials in seeking regional solutions to common problems.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Residents of Pelham:

With the close of 1983, the Pelham Police Department saw the end of a year in which the stabilization of many previous changes occurred and a year in which the department experienced considerable transition. Our efforts to improve and refine our work were somewhat successful but our full potential for improvement was diminished by personnel changes.

Our most dramatic loss during the year was seen in the departure of Sergeant Russell Hartley, a knowledgeable and experienced officer. After extensive testing and evaluation, Officer Richard Young was promoted to the rank of Sergeant bringing our supervisory staff back to full strength. Other changes in personnel were seen in the ranks of the part-time employees with seven employees leaving the department and a like number of new employees being hired. Even at the end of the year, this transition is incomplete as there still exists a vacancy for one full-time officer.

Despite these intermittent shortages of personnel, the department was able to have an apparent positive impact on the reported incidence of serious crime. There was a decrease in every category of Part I crime, with the exception of rape and burglary. While we can have little deterrent impact regarding the incidence of rape, we are disappointed to see a 10.09 percent increase in reported burglaries. Our efforts of directed patrols and the checking of residents' homes while they are away are evidently not enough to stem the rising tide of this most frequently reported serious crime. While more innovation in the analysis of reported burglaries will take place, residents are again urged to be aware of what is taking place in their neighborhoods and to report any suspicious activity.

Training continued to be a major goal of the department in 1983. In the month of June, we were very pleased to report that our newest officer, Michael Ogiba, graduated from the New Hampshire Police Academy ranking fifth in a class of 30. Training was offered to other officers on the subjects of management, supervision, drugs, search and seizure, firearms, chemical agents, alcohol breath taking, and other topics. We continue to believe that, the better trained an officer is, the more able he will be to serve the people of Pelham.

It is widely recognized, however, that no police department can effectively serve its community without their support and assistance. In that regard and to that end, I would like to take this opportunity to tahnk all of those who have been supportive of our efforts and to solicit the community as a whole to become involved with your police department to make Pelham a safer and better place to live.

PELHAM PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT - 1983

This report is dedicated to the memory of Pearl Atwood, Pelham's children's librarian for sixteen years.

It was another fine year for the library thanks to all our patrons and, of course, our staff. Our staff members include Cheryl Zani, whom we welcomed as our assistant director/children's librarian in April, Toni Chapman, Jackie Mierswa, Bette Kelley, Kathy Micciche, and Stuart Robertson. Assisting the staff were the following volunteers: Kay Alexandris, RSVP volunteer, Orlene Hagedorn, Laura Lanigan, Blanche Devine, Pam Tepolt, Carolyn Jones, Debra Bergeron, Laura Burns, Chris Forget, and Sandra Van Dyne, volunteer storytime readers.

Under the leadership of Pat Leary, the Friends of the Library in Pelham (FLIP) did their usual fantastic job in supporting the library through their various fundraisers. The annual book sale and Christmas craft fair netted the library over \$1,000. This year a Jr. FLIP was formed; the school-aged volunteers participated in the Christmas fair and raised \$30 for the library.

The library offered its annual babysitting course which was as always, well attended. The annual Pet Show, held in May, attracted a variety of pets with their proud owners. Our eight week summer "Super Readers" reading program had Superheroes as its theme and was innovative and exciting. Over fifty children received certificates at the end of the program. The weekly storytimes for pre-schoolers was expanded to two days a week and four sessions. We also ran twice-monthly craft sessions for pre-schoolers. A Christmas holiday book talk featuring gift books available for children was held on Dec. 8.

Cooperation with other town agencies has always been high on our priority list. A computer workshop for the heads of town departments was given by the library. We continued our involvement with the school media centers and libraries; this summer, as in the past, the Sherburne school lent us 200 children's books to "boost" our collection for the summer reading program. A collection of books is maintained at the Hobbs House for the seniors. Youngsters at Camp Alexander had their days enlivened by weekly storytimes.

A special town meeting approved appropriation of funds contingent on matching funds from a federal grant for the Title II library renovation program. Unfortunately, despite a well written grant request, we were not awarded funds because of our low unemployment rate. We did, however, obtain a CETA worker for the summer months.

The library trustees continued to update and create library personnel

policies, basing decisions on staff input and the work of trustee subcommittees. A salary schedule which included both full- and part-time employees was developed. Trustee Bob Coffill ran several eight week Basic computer courses using the library's three Apple II Plus computers. The trustees manned the table at Community Night, explaining programs and future plans.

The retrieval of overdue books was one of the key problems addressed in 1983. We utilized the workings of small claims court in order to effect the return of town property. The program is a definite success and will be continued. Our Fine Free Month was April; no fines were collected for any overdue materials during that time, except for those in the court process.

We will continue to provide Pelham with the same high quality of service and programming with the help of our outstanding staff and through judicious use of town funding.

PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT - 1983

To: The Board of Selectmen and Residents of Pelham

The Parks & Recreation Department in 1983 provided a total of 47 programs and special events, operated and maintained recreation facilities at four separate locations and prepared the groundwork for the development of additional facilities to meet Pelham's increasing appetite for recreational opportunities. Due to increased revenues, the department was able to provide this level of service with an operating budget that had a net cost which was \$1,783 less than the net cost of the 1982 operating budget.

In 1983, the department provided residents with over 2,300 hours of supervised recreation programs. Cumulative attendance figures indicate that 3,577 people were involved in the 47 programs and special events offered by the department and that overall participation increased by 10% in 1983. Greater participation was responsible in part for a thirty percent increase in revenues generated by the department. Projected revenue for the department in 1983 was estimated at \$8,750.00. By the end of the calendar year that figure will be in excess of \$12,000.00.

The Camp Alexander Facility continues to be the focal point for many outdoor recreational opportunities. The total daily attendance at the town beach wa 9,240 while registration for the playground program and swimming instruction was 207 and 82 respectively. Eleven groups and organizations used the Camp Alexander site for their annual outing.

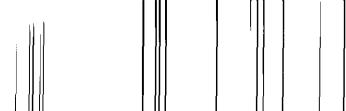
Once again, the Junior Leader Program afforded youth in their early teens an experience filled with recreational and educational activities and community service projects. In 1983, the community supported this group of young people and helped them raise \$967.00 for the New Hampshire Heart Association.

A number of capital improvements were implemented in 1983. The installation of signs at the entrance to Golden Brook Park completed an Eagle Scout Project at that facility and a local contractor donated his time and equipment to landscape an area adjacent to Newcomb Field. Part of the entrance to Camp Alexander has a new appearance due to landscaping completed at that site and work on the restrooms in the lodge of that facility will be completed in the spring and will make increased utilization of that building possible.

In 1983, Pelham received a very significant gift of prime recreation land from the late Teresa F. Muldoon of Mammoth Road. The intended use of this fifty acre parcel is stated explicitly in the terms of Mrs. Muldoon's bequest:

"This bequest and devise is made upon the condition and with the restriction that the land devised shall be forever and only used as a park

and recreation area for the rest, enjoyment and recreation of the public,



and that no buildings or structures shall be erected on said land except such as may be necessary for the use of said land as a park and recreation area and shall be named The George M. Muldoon Park."

The acceptance of this gift and the availability of federal funds afford a very good opportunity to develop needed recreation facilities without relying on appropriations at the local level.

In the first quarter of 1983, the department put together its first comprehensive brochure entitled "Recreational And Social Opportunities For The Entire Family." This publication which was mailed to each postal patron provides a complete listing and a brief synopsis of the recreational opportunities available through this department, and Pelham civic and social organizations, clubs and businesses. I wish to express my appreciation to the proprietors of the three Pelham businesses whose financial support made this project possible. You may pick up a free copy of the brochure at the recreation office if your have not already recieved one.

The number one priority in 1984 will be to review Pelham's existing and future need for recreational facilities and to determine the best and most cost efficient method for locating these facilities on park land currently owned by the town. Gravel deposits at the Elmer G. Raymond Memorial Park and the availability of federal funds for use at the Muldoon Property are the mechanisms through which recreational facilities can be developed at these sites without local tax appropriations.

I wish to thank the members of the Parks & Recreation Commission for their support and direction in the administration of the department. I also wish to thank the Selectmen and the members of the Budget Committee for their support. I would like to recognize the performance of the department's part-time and seasonal personnel whose high level of dedication and competency was instrumental in the delivery of services. The cooperation extended by the personnel of the other town departments and the School District was a major factor in assisting us to accomplish more than would otherwise have been possible. Finally, I wish to express a sincere thanks to the Pelham civic organizations and clubs and to the many individuals who volunteered their time and resources.

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INCINERATOR - RECYCLING FACILITY ANNUAL REPORT - 1983

To the Selectmen and Residents of Pelham:

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This past year has seen many productive changes at your recycling facility resulting in yet another increase in revenue and further progress in a more efficient operation.

I am very proud and pleased to report that the anticipated revenue for 1983 is approximately \$20,000.00. This year's revenue tripled the amount collected prior to my assuming the Superintendent position and I view this as one of the outstanding achievements at the facility. I wish to thank the residents and incinerator employees for their co-operation in this area. It is this spirit and effort that has made the facility so productive.

The roofing has been installed over the two main incinerator units and they are now protected from the weather.

The new skid steer loader has worked out extremely well resulting in a faster more efficient operation. The steam cleaner equipment has proven to be a real asset not only in the glass bin area but also in our preventative maintenance program.

We have installed an electrical entrance at the glass bin building to accommodate the welding and steam cleaner needs in that area. If the budget request is approved it is my intention to install lights at the bins for the convenience and safety of the residents.

We have also set up an area for the disposal of used motor oil and this has worked out well.

So much for the good news, now I wish to address a problem area which is of deep concern to me. You are aware of the fact that the request for an appropriation to repair the firebricks was not approved last year at Town Meeting. As a result these firebrick liners have deteriorated to the point of now being a very serious problem. We have repeatedly patched and made temporary repairs and still face the need to do the job correctly. A warrant article addressing this area has been submitted for your consideration.

In closing I wish to thank the residents for their co-operation without which, our achievements would not have been accomplished.

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY AGENT - 1983

To the Selectmen and Residents of Pelham:

A great deal has happened during 1983 and I would like to take this opportunity to highlight those events.

Each year Pelham's inventory of roads increases with new development and acceptance of existing roads which comply with town requirements. During 1983, Pelham also became fully responsible for Marsh Road, (2.53 miles) and Nashua Road, (1.52 miles). The State of New Hampshire reclassified these roads to class IV highways, making the town responsible. The reclassification was based on the 1980 Federal census which established the town's population at 8086. Based on this population and state statutes, a compact section was established, and these roads were given to the town.

Also during 1983, the New State Highway Block Grant Aid Program has replaced the Town Road Aid (TRA), Highway Subsidy, and the Additional Highway Subsidy programs. In past years, the town had received funding directly from the State of N.H. for Highway Subsidy and Additional Highway Subsidy programs. This funding was reflected in town receipts and not in the highway budgets. On the other hand, TRA funding from the state had never been reflected in the town's records. These projects had been supervised by state officials and expenditures for these projects were paid directly to the contractors involved. TRA funding for the states fiscal year ending June, 1983 amounted to approximately \$12,000. This funding will now be received by the town via the New State Highway Block Grant Aid Program.

SUMMER MAINTENANCE: This included patching and hottopping; brush and tree cutting; trash removal; graveling and grading dirt roads; and sign installation. 1983 has been an expensive and time-consuming year for sign replacement. More signs than ever before have been maliciously damaged or stolen.

WINTER MAINTENANCE: As we have seen in past years, Mother Nature is very unpredictable and the costs of winter maintenance can vary significantly. The past two years have proved to be fairly average years for snow and ice. With the addition of Marsh Road, Nashua Road, and new developments, we are continually adding to our snowfighting force.

Because Nashua and Marsh Roads are heavily traveled, they must be sanded and salted much more frequently than any other town road. This requires more manpower, equipment, and supplies.

During each storm, I receive approximately 40-60 telephone complaints. Some are warranted, and many others are unreasonable and or premature. Each piece of equipment has a 4-6 hour route, and there is not enough equipment or funds to keep each road totally clear throughout the storm. Our main concern is to keep all roads open during the storm, and when it is over, all roads, intersections, schools, and other town facilities are cleared of snow and ice.

Our goal is to keep the roads as safe as possible, and we would like to thank all those residents who have been patient and understanding with Mother Nature and with those individuals who make our roads safe.

RECONSTRUCTION: Road improvements were made to Tallant Road, Simpson Road, and Hayden Road.

300 feet of culvert and two catch basins were added to a section of Tallant Road. This should be a significant improvement to the serious drainage problems of the past.

744 feet of culvert and four catch basins were added to Simpson Road where serious drainage problems have also existed.

Hayden Road was the single largest reconstruction project during 1983. Here the gravel portion of road was widened, drainage added, and a mix-and-place surfacing was accomplished.

The 1983 reconstruction overexpenditure was caused by a change in state highway funding as mentioned earlier.

BRIDGE: Bridge repairs included the extention of guardrail on the Moeckel Road Bridge and normal maintenance on all other bridges.

The Old Bridge Street Bridge was refurbished with granite and reinforced by rod and concrete.

RESEALING: During 1983, 23 roads (13 miles) were resealed. I stressed the importance of resealing to you in the 1982 report, and it would be redundant to mention it again. I still seek your support in funding resealing heavily, particularly in the next few years to bring all roads to fair conditions.

1983 ANNUAL REPORT FROM THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT

To the Board of Selectmen and Pelham Residents:

Since my appointment to the position of Health Officer in May 1982, I would like to report the following:

Day Care Inspections: Total number of Day Care facilities in Pelham is eleven. This year three were up for reinspection with the following items evaluated. Health records - children and staff, safety and cleanliness. I would like to take this time to mention that our town has a fine quality of Day Care.

Dye Testing: Fifteen of these tests were performed for the purpose of detecting suspected failed septic systems with all of them showing negative results as of January 1, 1984.

Senior Citizens Center: An inspection was performed on the Center and conditions were found to be highly favorable. I would like to take the opportunity to commend the staff on their constant effort in the daily maintenance of the facility.

Food Establishments: My receipt of a letter from Debra Bevens, (sanitarian director) of Concord, New Hampshire, indicates bi-yearly inspections of local food establishments will be conducted by her office.

In closing I wish to take this opportunity to inform the Board of Selectmen and the citizens of Pelham that it is my opinion as Health Officer, that their immediate attention be given to funding and staffing the Health Department. It is obvious, with the constant turnover of Health Officers, there is indication of a serious need regarding proper compensation for duties expected at present, and further anticipated increased work load caused by extensive budget cuts at the state level.

I wish to thank the clerical staff at the Town Hall for their dedicated assistance in my department.

PELHAM CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1983 ANNUAL REPORT

Through the voluntary effort and time of the members of the Pelham Conservation Commission, the Commission has continued to show environmental awareness and concern. The Commission is empowered to:

- Protect and encourage proper use of natural resources and water shed resources;
- 2. Research local land and water areas;
- Index open space and wetland areas and provide a plan for the proper use of these areas.

In 1983 the Commission continued to effectively perform its duties.

The Commission has continued to hold public meetings on dredge and fill applications, as well as assist the state in site review for dredge and fill applications. In many instances, the Commission conferred with local, state, and federal officials to be sure there would be no harmful effect on ground water quality.

For the seventh consecutive year Commission members, on a weekly basis from Memorial Day to Labor Day, continued our water testing program for town streams and ponds. This is done in conjunction with the Health Officer.

Individual Commission members have attended conferences, workshops, and seminars in such areas as "prime wetlands" inventory, to enable us to continue our planning for conducting a "prime wetlands" survey for the Town of Pelham. When completed the survey will provide mappings of those areas of Pelham having "very poorly drained soils" as defined by the Soils Conservation Service of the United States Department of Agriculture.

During 1983 the Commission was able to send three Pelham youths to State Conservation Camp - a valuable educational experience.

The Commission invites public participation at our meetings throughout the year, held on the fourth Thursday of each month, at 7:30 P.M., Town Hall.

Finally, the Commission wishes to acknowledge the efforts of three now retired Commission members, Michael Jones, Donna Grajeda, and Alice Kirby. Thank you all for your efforts.

PELHAM SENIOR CITIZENS, INC.



Fiscal year 1983 brought many changes to the Senior Center on Nashua Road. Council on Aging meetings were changed to be held the same day as the Senior meeting - the second Thursday of the month, at 11:00 a.m. - Senior's meeting at 1:00 p.m. Harry M. Day took over Hank Hewson's job as Center "handy-man."

Two donated pool tables, in need of repair, were renovated by our own seniors at no cost to the town. The difficulty of mounting the high first step of the senior bus was eliminated by the making and donation of a solid wood step-stool, also by one of our seniors. A stereo was acquired - to belong to the seniors - but also to be used by the line-dance group. In March, the seniors became the owners of their own bus, as the title was returned to them by the State. A new secretary took over in May, as Terri Oliver stepped down because of other commitments. Elections in July saw a new slate of officers - as listed. In August, the St. Joseph's Site Coordinator changed as Kathy Thibault went back to school, and Sharon Iodice took over the hot lunch program.

Summer saw the installation - all volunteer work - of a fence along the front and side driveway of the Hobbs House, thus protecting the shrubs - also donated - that grace the Senior Center.

In December, the town, under the arrangements of new administrative assistant Dennis McNamara and selectmen, installed a badly needed new septic system and leaching field on the Hobbs House property, as it was at a point of "no return" with a possible hazardous situation confronting the seniors who eat there every day.

The monthly newsletters got a face-lift by getting commercially printed - at no cost at all to the seniors - and also by going modern - as mailing labels were computerized at the Pelham Public Library - all freely donated through the efforts in our behalf by Police Chief William G. Collis.

Membership at the center increased from approximately 300 to over 500 as of this report. However, along with this increase, we suffered the loss of six of our very active senior members.

The usual weekly activities prevail, with candlepin bowling on Monday in Salem — Craft day, Tuesday — card games on Wednesday and various trips taking place during the good weather months. Thursday morning, the rearranged dining area fills with line-dancers, with a teacher coming from Salem, but with the senior paying their own small fee for the lessons. Friday allows those who prefer, to bowl "ten-pin" in Lowell as the bus comes from the lanes to pick them up. Others prefer to stay at the center and play bingo.

Yearly activities included yard sales and craft fairs sponsored by the Council on Aging. A few seniors even participated in a Fashion Show at the Salem High School, staged by the Town & Country Playhouse. Seniors were kept enjoyably busy with their Annual Senior Dance, held in October at St. Patrick's Hall — the Christmas Party given by the Council at Harris's Inn, to which an all time high of 219 persons attended — the annual Golden Agers Dinner given by the Lion's Club of Pelham at Harris's Inn — the Pelham High Honor Society dinner given in December — and their own Christmas and New Year's Parties held at the center.

Headed by Sunshine Chairlady, Ruth Chamberlin, members made Christmas visits to the nursing homes and to shut-ins, carrying baskets made up of fruit and cookies. Local church services - of all denominations - were attended by many seniors, as they do every year.

Yes, a busy year, and a most successful year ensued, ending with this being the **third year** successively, that no increase in budget was requested by the Senior Citizens, Inc. of Pelham.

CEMETERY TRUSTEES



In 1983 there were 34 burials in the town cemeteries. We maintain the Gibson Cemetery, Gumpas Cemetery, North Pelham Cemetery, Lyons Cemetery, and Atwood Cemetery.

A total of \$15,432.63 was returned to the general fund from the sale of lots, the opening of graves, and the cemetery trust funds. In 1983 it cost the taxpayers of Pelham approximately \$6,000 less to operate the Cemetery Dept. than it did in 1976. This is due in part to an increase in the price of lots, an increase in the amount of lots sold, and an increase in trust fund interest paid into the general fund to offset our budget.

Fourteen maple trees were planted along the main avenues in Gibson Cemetery to replace the ones that have died over the years.

Five avenues were oil penetrated totaling 12,670 sq. ft. Another three avenues were graveled which we would like to oil-penetrate in 1984.

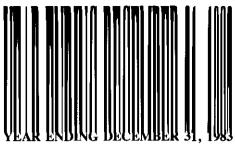

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REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and the Citizens of Pelham:

It is with great pleasure that I submit, to you, my ninth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Public schools have been thrust into the national spotlight during this past year. Noticeably, several reports have been written regarding the failures of the system. The report which captured most of our attention was the nationally commissioned "A Nation at Risk". This particular report indicated that "our society and its educational institution seem to have lost sight of the basic purpose of schooling, and of the high expectations and disciplined effort needed to attain them". The question we must ask ourselves is whether or not such statements properly depict education in Pelham? Also, what will be done to achieve a better educational future for our children.

In an attempt to draw some preliminary conclusions about the condition of education in Pelham, I will discuss teaching, standards, partnerships, leadership and future trends and comment on each topic in relation to our current status or practice.

Several years ago, Pelham began educational reforms related to promoting excellence. Among those reforms was the necessity to improve the quality of our teaching force through better salaries. For the past three years, we have, with the support of the community, made considerable gains in the average salary a teacher receives. Currently, our average annual salary is \$16,357 which places Pelham above the state average of \$15,353. This factor has been significant in helping us to retain highly qualified and dedicated teachers. Nevertheless, we must continue to move starting base of \$10,850 upward in order to initially attract the best college graduate available, while not losing sight of rewarding our senior staff members. Remember, it takes more than ten years to reach the quoted average salary; so obviously, there is much to accomplish.

Time and people are our most valuable resources. The necessity to use all available time to the maximum benefit has been emphasized through revides attendance and discipline policies, better management practices by administrators and teachers, reduction of classroom interruptions and the development of programs for low-ability, low-achieving students and enrichment programs for able students. The students of our school district have clearly benefitted from these curriculum reforms. They have the opportunity to be engaged in meaningful learning activities which are appropriate to their academic performance and achievement level.

motion, retention and placement. Again, the focus is upon students meeting assigned levels of instruction in accordance with performance and achievement. Secondary students must successfully complete twenty units of work to graduate. Mandated units include four in English, two in mathematics, two in science and three in social sciences. The implementation of this specific core curriculum has been encouraged by many of the previously referenced national studies. It has been a praetice in Pelham since 1979.

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A critical element in many of these developments has been the partnerships created between the community and the schools. The schools cannot and should not exist independently of the community served. The schools gain support for operating budgets and capital projects because of working relationships developed with the business sector, private education, municipal groups and civic organizations. Budgets which are carefully scrutinized by the Municipal Budget Committee, cooperation which exists between town and school officials on appropriation payments, community use of our facilities, student work placements arranged in local businesses. school sponsored senior citizen activities, financial and personal support from civic organizations, Chapter II services for parochial school students, and industry donations for technological advancements are but just a few examples of existing partnerships. Schools are the centers of our community. There are many volunteers and interested parents who help us to improve education in general. These partnerships will have to continue and expand for the benefit of all Pelham ehildren.

Strong leadership will provide the impetus for future improvements. Elected officials, appointed officials and interested citizens, together, will provide the support and involvement necessary to sustain a positive climate and an informed populace. Our school system must meet the challenges of excellence through leaders who are knowledgeable, caring and courageous. The debate relative to the importance of schools and the recources required to fund schools will be significant to the future existence of public education as we know it today.

Ultimately, the decisions which are made today will come to rest in the future. Schooling as we have known it will change. Change is healthy when an institution is responsible for shaping tomorrow. In this age of technology, it is vital that systematic planning be an integral part of the process. Computer literacy, advanced curriculum, demographic developments and emerging trends in fields as yet discovered will impact the schools and community in general. The necessity to accurately forecast and appropriately plan will be essential.

In the end, most constituents will ask, what is the price tag for excellence? Education is an investment. However, it is an investment whose financial burden has been squarely placed upon the shoulders of the local property taxpayer. An examination of our appropriations and revenues will closely parallel state averages. State averages indicate that New Hampshire receives 3.9% of the revenues from the federal government (50th in the nation); an additional 6.9% from the state (50th in the nations) and 89.2% from local sources (1st in the nation). New Hampshire's fiscal reliance on the property tax must be addressed. One responsible measure which could alleviate some of this local burden is insisting that the legislature fund foundation aid. In five years, Pelham has had the local tax base expanded as foundation aid went from a peak total of \$309,811 to nothing for this current year. The foundation aid law is a good one, designed to help those districts with a limited property tax base. The law should be supported by each of us and funded by our legislators in order to help the property taxpayer who is currently required to balance both local and state budgets.

These are exciting times. These are challenging times. These are times which require cooperation, critical analysis and commitment. Pelham is unique in its sustained support to public education. It has not gone unnoticed nor unappreciated by any of us. As would be the case in any organization, accomplishments and successes reflect a team effort. Principals Howell, Goyette and Kolifrath are dedicated educators who can and do make a difference in their schools. The Pelham School Board is a good Board. The Board is conscientious, thorough and caring in the discharge of their responsibilities. They too make a difference. To each professional and support staff, I extend my thanks and continued encouragement for a job extremely well done. Together, let us follow a blueprint towards excellence. An excellence which would be unprecedented in our district.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF SPECIAL SERVICES

Dear Mr. LaBranche:

During the past three years, we have worked to develop a comprehensive program of special services which would serve a broad spectrum of needs in the least restrictive environment. The philosphy of open door resource rooms, qualified professional staff, effective team coordination and cooperative classroom teachers have contributed to this goal.

Despite space restrictions at the middle school, we have been able to provide quality time and instruction for over sixty-five (65) students through the addition of two federally funded teacher assistants. The resource room staff is to be commended for its dedicaton, cooperation and flexibility in serving our students. Further assistance within the regular classroom is provided to encourage mainstreaming. Population indicates that a structured environment for more moderately disabled students should be initiated as soon as space is available. Reintegration efforts and the in-district programs which have been developed have proven to be cost effective.

Programming efforts at the high school have been successful financially, socially and educationally. The drop-out rate for educationally handicapped students has declined yearly. Through a competitive Improvement Grant, we were awarded funds to develop pre-vocational work stations to introduce the vocabulary and basic concepts needed in the following areas: computer technology, business/office, distributive education, drafting/graphics, electronics, small engines, health care, carpentry and photography. Some of the materials and units of study have been integrated into the pre-vocational department. Our students learn well through direct experience and some have developed sufficient skill and interest in an area to secure work-study part time employment.

The Chapter I program is an integral part of our educational system. Students experiencing academic difficulty may receive small group tutoring in basic math or reading skills to enable them to function on grade level. This program faithfully meets its yearly goals and objectives. Unfortunately, we anticipate decreased funding levels in the future and, therefore, we are investigating ways to continue the project in both reading and math.

Federal funds from 94-142 are providing the following supplemental services to Pelham students: two teacher assistants (certified teachers) at Memorial School, a part time aide at Sherburne School, preschool language evaluation and therapy, intellectual assessments and an early identification program through Child Check Screenings as mandated by the New Hampshire State Standards.

Nationwide, early identification and remediaton have proven to be cost effective endeavors. The developmental preschool years is the prime time to ancourage the normal language, motor, social and attending skills necessary for all future education. Through the S.E.R.E.S.C. Regional Program, we have been able to provide service for our moderately involved youngsters. However, a less restrictive environment to remediate mild to moderate delays should be developed. Various delivery models are being investigated and a proposal will be forthcoming.

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Empirical data and findings from an extensive federal research project in the field of learning disabilities has been made available to determine the effects of the Education of All Handicapped Children Act of 1975. This information is the first conclusive evidence in this relatively young field and we will be carefully considering the implications in al future programs. Methods of teaching effective learning strategies have already been shared with resource room and classroom teachers.

Computer technology and applications as well as other teaching machines are currently being studied for possible use in special education. Although it is too early to have data regarding their effectiveness, computers are certainly motivational to students and should help teachers plan and monitor effective individual programs.

In conclusion, Pelham has demonstrated its capability to develop and support in-district programs and is continuing in this direction to serve all handicapped youngsters who could benefit by being in a public school. I thank the principals and their staffs for the cooperation and efforts on behalf of our handicapped students; the Pelham School Board members, Mr. LaBranche and Mr. Kaffel for their support and encouragement.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Dear Mr. LaBranch:

As I start my eleventh year as Principal of the E.G. Sherburne School, it is with pleasure that I look back upon ten years of real accomplishment. The progress that has been made is a tribute to the teaching staff and the support from Central Office and the parents of our students. As you know, our school is a fully accredited, level 1B elementary school, which is one of the two highest ratings an elementary school can have in New Hampshire.

Our most outstanding accomplishment to date is the high level of academic achievement proven by the longitudinal study of our SRA testing, which shows that our students continually score between a half a deviation to a full deviation above the national average. This achievement is a true inidication of the successful implementation of the curriculum as it has been established at the district level, as well as at the Sherburne School. Also, the accountability testing over the last four years has provided direction for out curriculum refinements in the areas of computational math and students' writing abilities. To that end, the accountability testing of last spring has shown marked improvement in our students' ability to achieve the high expectations that have been set for them.

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As you know, our philosophy of education has always been to educate the whole child and to meet the needs of each child regardless of their level of ability. Two years ago, we instituted the TAG Program (Talented and Gifted), which has had a very positive influence upon the entire learning environment. Every child in the school has benefited from the level 1 and level 2 activities that we have been able to provide. The "Sherburne Sun" publication, which is solely produced by the students of the Sherburne School, with the TAG teacher as advisor, is a true credit to the type of ability elementary students have when channelled into the proper areas.

Computer education and literacy has become a national issue, and we at the Sherburne School have had the opportunity to have each and every teachr on staff take part in the Computeronics Workshop provided through the New Hampshire Facilitator Center. Therefore, the staff has a working knowledge of computers and its application to students' educational needs.

In the area of special needs, dramatic changes have taken place, over the past ten years, as we attempt to meet the educational needs of our special students. We have added an L.D. Specialist and two aides who test and determine a child's specific learning problems and write individual educational plans that guide the learning process over a period of a year, with a set review time. In the Resource Room, we have added an aide to the program and shifted the emphasis of the program too allow us to work with

the child who is truly identified as a special needs student rather than many of the L.D. students who were previously serviced. The main emphasis of the program has been to mainstream these students into the general school population as much as possible.

In the future, we are looking forward to the possibility of adding public kindergarten. We are now in the process of verifying the present census figures to make sure that we have adequate physical facilities for this program. Finally, our number one priority as far as the physical features of the building are concerned, as indicated by out needs assessment of last spring, conytinues to be the installation of walls in the open concept area to enhance the academic programs.

I would like to thank the professional staff of the Sherburne School, Mr. LaBranche and the General Office staff and the members of the School Board for their endeavors to help us provide an educational program and facility that we can take pride in.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Dear Mr. LaBranche:

It is with great pleasure that I submit, to you, my annual report as Principal of Memorial School.

This past year was busy with the introduction of a new gifted and talented program, and the reinforcement of two others, i.e. special needs and computer education.

With regard to the gifted and talented program, over twenty students are in our talent pool and all are benefitting by doing individual or group projects. In addition, all fifth grade students were introduced to seven enrichment activities. The program will continue to grow this school year as we expand our efforts with the sixth graders.

The special needs program grew twofold. More than seventy students are now being serviced or monitored. The school's computer education program which has been federally funded has given all or our seventh and eighth graders an overview of computers as well as some knowledge of "basic" literacy. It is our intent to further expand this program.

Our SRA test results reflect the high quality of education for which we strive. Our students scored significantly higher than the national norms. The accountability test results were the best ever; 86% of the students tested scored above the expected outcomes.

For the past three years the teachers and I have been encouraging enrichment activities to benefit the students. In my opinion, many of the following activities that were initiated either last year or before will have a lasting impact on the students' education. These include career day, science fair, student government day, spirit day, band and chorus exchanges, spectator buses to away games, dinner dance, award day and graduation. Perhaps the highlight was the eighth grade trip to our Nation's Capitol. I believe that these are worthwhile activities and welcome suggestions for more.

Last year, I made several recommendations for specific needs. A security alarm system for the school is the only one yet to be fulfilled. In addition to this, I have concerns for this year: to replace teh windows so as to allow for better ventilation, and budgetary support for all existing programs as outlined in my budget.

In conclusion, it has been a pleasure to continue working for you, the School Board, and the members of this community. I must commend my entire staff for all of their efforts in assuring for a superb educational program. With everyone's support, I look forward to another successful year.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Dear Mr. LaBranche:

Once again it is my pleasure to report, to you, the state of affairs at Pelham High School over the last year. The school has continued to improve through change. As our nation cries out for more structure and time on task, I am pleased to reflect on the progress of Pelham High School, realizing that we have been moving steadily in this direction over the last few years.

Most recently, a major decision was made to replace the trimester delivery system with the more widely accepted semester system. We do not plan to sit back and admire our success, but continue our efforts in improving program and presentation.

The new semester system will see changes in all four of the core subject areas; Mathematics, Science, English and Social Studies. We have closed our ten year old smoking area with the exception of before school and during lunch. We have added walls to the Math area, making the environment much more conducive to instruction and have plans for the English/Social Studies area for this summer. Our Music Department has been organized, combining efforts with Memorial School, and has proven to be a great success in increasing both the quantity of those involved as well as quality. We are currently working on improving the countenance of Pelham High School. Our Building Improvement Committee has planted shrubs and placed mulch. We would like to have the outside of our school reflect the good things that are to be found inside.

Faculty and student morale continues to improve. Students have accepted our "new rules" without much complaint, realizing that each change is for the best. The faculty seems to have stabilized, as there were few openings to fill this past summer. This stabilization should prove to be very valuable.

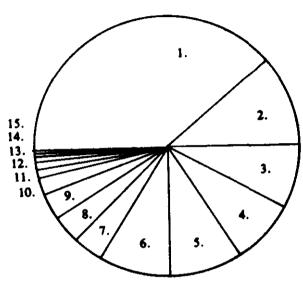

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Pelham School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1983, as listed in the accompanying table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Pelham School District at June 30, 1983 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole. The combining fund and account group financial statements and supplemental schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Pelham School District. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined financial statements and, in our opinion is stated fairly in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

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ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON INTERNAL ACCOUNTING CONTROL

To the Members of the School Board Pelham School District Pelham, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements of the Pelham School District for the year ended June 30, 1983, and have issued our report thereon dated August 19, 1983. As part of our examination, we made a study and evaluation of the School District's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. The purpose of our study and evaluation was to determine the nature, timing and extent of the auditing procedures necessary for expressing an opinion on the School District's financial statements. Our study and evaluation was more limited than would be necessary to express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control taken as a whole.

The management of the Pelham School District is responsible for establishing and maintaining a system of internal accounting control. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of control procedures. The objectives of a system are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use of disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Because of inherent limitations in any system of internal accounting control, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the system to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study and evaluation made for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph would not necessarily disclose all material weaknesses in the system. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the system of internal accounting of the Pelham School District, taken as a whole. However, our study and evaluation disclosed no condition that we believed to be a material weakness.

This report is intended solely for the use of the Pelham School District, State of New Hampshire and the cognizant and other federal audit agencies and should not be used for any other purpose.

ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON COMPLIANCE

To the Members of the School Board Pelham School District Pelham, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements of the Pelham School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1983, and have issued our report thereon dated August 19, 1983. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, the provisions of "Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions", promulgated by the Comptroller General, which pertain to financial and compliance audits; the Office of Management and Budget's "Major Compliance Features of Programs Administered by State and Local Governments" (the approved compliance supplement); and, except as described in the following paragraphs, provisions of Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-102, "Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants-In-Aid to State and Local Governments", Attachment P, "Audit Requirements" and the Guidelines for Financial and Compliance Audits of Federally Assisted Programs (Guidelines), and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The reporting objectives for compliance audits contained in the Guidelines suggest an examination of all transactions for compliance purposes, as opposed to the selective testing required by Attachment P; therefore, we have followed the reporting objectives of Attachment P. In addition, the Guidelines do not provide sufficient guidance for determining the representative number of charges to be examined and performing the procedures to ascertain compliance. Accordingly, we utilized other materials as supplements in those areas.

Attachment P requires that the examination include a determination of whether the Federal financial reports (including financial status reports, cash reports, and claims for advances and reimbursements) prepared by the Pelham School District contain accurate and reliable financial data. We have been informed that OMB interprets the phrase "accurate and reliable financial data" to mean that the Federal financial reports present the underlying financial data of the grants within limits that are reasonable and practicable to attain under the circumstances.

In our opinion, except for the matters that might have come to our attention had our examination encompassed the provisions of the Guidelines referred to in the second preceding paragraph, for the tested operations and records, the Pelham School District complied with the material terms and conditions of its Federal grants, contracts and agreements, and the tested Federal financial reports present the underlying financial data of the grants within the limits described in the preceding paragraph. Further, based upon our examination and the procedures referred to above and except for the matters that might have come to our attention had our examination encompassed the provisions of the Guidelines referred to in the second preceding paragraph, nothing came to our attention to indicate that the Pelham School District had not complied with the compliance matters referred to above, and the Federal financial reports do not present the underlying financial data of the grants within the limits described in the preceding paragraph.

This report is intended solely for the use of the Pelham School District and the cognizant audit agency and should not be used for any other purpose.

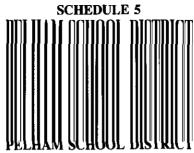

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 1983

NOTE I - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

A. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the School District are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the School District:

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the School District. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Special Revenue Funds - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action. Included in this fund type are Food Service and Federal/State Projects funds.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

Agency Funds - Agency Funds are used to account for the assets held as an agent by the School District for others. The Student Activities Funds are shown in this fund type.

B. Account Groups (Fixed Assets and Long-Term Liabilities)

All governmental funds are accounted for on a spending or "financial flow" measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period.

General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. These expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State, the School District does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

Long-term liabilities expected to be financed from governmental funds are accounted for in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group. This account group is not a fund. It is concerned only with the measurement of financial position and not results of operations. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long-term liabilities are not recognized as governmental fund type liabilities. They are instead reported as liabilities in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group.

C. Basis of Accounting

The acconts of the General and Special Revenue Funds are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, sources of financial resources and assets are recognized when measurable and available to finance operations during the year. Uses of financial resources and liabilities are recognized when obligations are incurred from receipt of goods and services, when assessments are made by the State or in the case of judgments and claims against the Shool District, when there is a probability that such judgments and claims will result in liabilities, the amounts of which can be

reasonably estimated. Exceptions to this general rule include: 1) accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay, and 2) principal and interest on general long-term debt which is recognized when due. All Agency funds are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting.

D. Budgetary Accounting

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the School Districts' operations. State Statutes require balanced budgets and the use of beginning general fund unreserved fund balance to reduce District Assessments. In 1982-83, the beginning fund balance was applied as follows:

E. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year-end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures and are, therefore, reported as part of the fund balance at June 30 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year.

The reserve for encumbrances at June 30 consists of the following:

F. Inventories

Inventory in the General and Special Revenue funds consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. The cost thereof has been recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items were purchased.

G, Accumulated Unpaid Vacation and Sick Pay

Accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay is not accrued in the governmental funds using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Teachers may accumulate up to one hundred five days sick leave at a rate of eighteen days per year. Non-certified employees are entitled to one and one-quarter days per month sick leave for each month worked, up to one hundred five days accumulation. Vacation is granted in varying amounts based on length of service for employees other than teachers. Vacation pay accumulation does not exceed a normal year's allowance. It is the policy of the District to recognize the cost of sick leave only at the time payments are made.

H. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations the School District has numerous transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services and fund capital outlay. The accompanying governmental fund financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

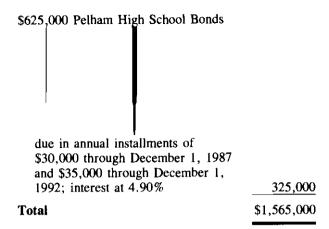

NOTE 3 - PENSION PLAN

The teachers and employees are covered under the State of New Hampshire Retirement System. The District's contribution for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the entire State plan. Since the actuarial valuation is performed on the entire State plan the amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets for the Pelham School District is not available. The District does not have an accrued liability for past service costs. The retirement cost for 1982-83 was \$37,767.

(\$.90 per capita) (RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Unemployment Compensation Insurance through the New Hampshire Municipal Association (NHMA), the unexpended portion of said fund to be carried over to the following year and used as an off-set to that year's unemployment compensation fund payment. (RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for Worker's Compensation Insurance, under the New Hampshire Municipal Association (NHMA) Self-Funded Worker's Compensation Fund. The unexpended balance and any dividends and/or rebates received from the fund to be carried over to the following year and used as a offset to that year's payment to said fund. (RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITEE)
- 33. To see if the Town will vote pursuant to the provisions of New Hampshire R.S.A. 674:5 to authorize the Pelham Planning Board to prepare and amend annually a recommended program of municipal capital improvement projects projected over a period of at least six (6) years. (BY PETITION)
- 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the purpose of employing a full-time Building Inspector/Code Administrator whose duties shall include:

1. Reviewing and approving all Building Code permit applications.

- 2. Issuing all Building Code Permits.
- 3. Making all inspections required by the Town's Building Codes.
- 4. Assisting applicants who are applying for zoning, building code, hazardous pits, subdivision, site review and other similar permits.
- 5. Expediting the granting of permits and the resolution of problems arising under the Town's various codes.
- Implementing a fair, impartial and effective code enforcement program.
- Providing administrative assistance to the Board of Health, the Board of Adjustment, the Planning Board, and the Conservation Commission.
- Serving as the administrative officer called for by the Town's zoning, hazardous pits, sanitary landfill and other similar ordinances.
- 9. Serving as the Town's sewage disposal system inspector.
- Such other building and land use duties as the Board of Selectmen may prescribe. (BY PETITION) (NOT RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)
- 35. To see if the Town will vote, pursuant to Senate Bill 221, to withdraw the sum of \$10,000.00 from funds now in or hereinafter placed in the Elmer G. Raymond Memorial Park Capital Reserve Fund and place said sum in the Elmer G. Raymond Memorial Park Trust Fund, heretofor established for the operation and maintenance of said Park. No portion whatsoever of said sum shall be raised by local taxes. This warrant article shall remain in full force and effect until fully utilized or until modified or revoked by a subsequent annual Town Meeting. (BY PETITION) (RECOMMEND-ED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)
- 36. To see if the Town will vote to expend the sum of \$2,500.00 from income generated by the Elmer G. Raymond Memorial Park Trust Fund for the purpose of operating and maintaining the Park for the period beginning on March 15, 1984 and ending on March 15, 1985. No portion of said \$2,500.00 shall be raised by local taxes. (BY PETITION) (RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

- 37. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw from funds now in or hereinafter placed in the Elmer G. Raymond Memorial Park Capital Reserve Fund the sum of \$20,000.00 and to expend the same to make capital improvements to the Park. No portion whatsoever of said amount shall be raised by local taxes. This warrant article shall remain in full force and effect until fully utilized or until modified or revoked by a subsequent annual Town Meeting. (BY PETITION) (RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)
- 38. To see if the Town will vote to dedicate the recreational area known as Camp Alexander and so name it the Pelham Veterans Memorial Park, and authorize the placement of a permanent and appropriate memorial marker at the entrance to the said facilities, or take action relative thereto. (BY PETITION)
- 39. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following policy relative to handicapped citizens; The Town of Pelham recognizes and affirms that an individual's rights and equal protection of the laws cannot be denied because of a handicapping condition or disability; that it is the policy of this State and this Town to guarantee the equal rights of all its citizens; and that the Town will assist handicapped residents as they assert those rights in living within the community.
- 40. To see if the Town will vote to go on record to request the Selectmen, that any increase in the premiums paid by the Town of Pelham for the medical and health insurance provided the employees of the Town of Pelham, be paid by the employees. This shall apply to all insurance except workman's compensation insurance. (BY PETITION)
- 41. To see if the town will go on record to request the Selectmen to consider that any new taxes generated from any new business or industry by used 50% to decrease the present tax rate, and 50% for priority items to be determined by the Selectmen and the School Board. (BY PETITION)
- 42. To see if the Town will go on record to request the Selectmen to consider putting on the ballot at the next annual election (March, 1985) a requirement that a quorum of 190 registered voters of the Town of Pelham be present at any Town Meeting to make such actions of said Town Meetings to be legal and binding. (BY PETITION)

43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen

to sell one lot 20 ft. x 80 ft. of back wood land owned by the Town which is by the land owned by Harold Chareauneuf. This lot on the town map No. 12 lot No. 84 is assessed for \$50.00. (BY PETITION) (NOT RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)

- 44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell 2.75 acres of Town land located on Tax Map, page 4, Parcel 8, which abuts the property of William C. and Susan Kolifrath and Joseph Zold, having an estimated value of Two Thousand, Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$2,250.00), based on the 1982 revaluation of the Town of Pelham. (BY PETITION) (NOT RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)
- 45. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Board of Selectmen to reinstitute the practice of recycling newspaper, magazines, etc. at the Incinerator facility for the benefit of Mrs. Dottie Hall who has performed this service for many years. (BY PETITION)
- 46. To see if the Town will vote to establish a fund to be known as the Incinerator Recycling Facility Revenue Fund for the purpose of capital improvements at the Incinerator Recycling Facility. Thirty percent of all funds paid to the Town as Incinerator Recycling Facility revenue are to be deposited in an interest bearing fund. No portion of the fund whatsoever shall be raised by local taxes. No income from said fund shall be appropriated or expended except in accordance with the applicable budget procedures of the Town. This warrant article shall remain in full force and effect until fully utilized or until modified or revoked by a subsequent annual Town Meeting. (RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)
- 47. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Committee to be known as the Pelham Technical Staff (PTechS). Members of this committee are to serve for a period of three years except that those members appointed to the Pelham Technical Staff in the year that the staff is organized shall be appointed one third to a one (1) year term, one third to a two (2) year term, and the remaining third to a three (3) year term. All members of the Pelham Technical Staff shall serve without remuneration. The terms of service shall be allotted to the first members of the Pelham Technical Staff by the use of a drawing and the rules of chance. The Pelham Technical Staff shall contain not more than nine (9) voting members plus a voting representative from the Board of Selectmen and from the School Committee. The duties of this committee shall be to bring the

capabilities of technology to the service of the town and the school. The committee shall additionally serve as a staff resource for the Board of Selectmen and the School Committee. The operation and organization of the Pelham Technical Staff shall proceed under those rules adopted by a majority of the staff in public meeting. To qualify as a staff candidate an individual shall have an expertise in a technical or scientific discipline thru graduation from a college technical curriculum or thru professional experience.

- 48. To see if the Town of Pelham shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Pelham, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire. (BY PETITION)
- 49. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1984 fiscal year, provided that such expenditure be made for the purposes for which a Town may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other Town funds. Further, that the Selectmen hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money. (RECOMMENDED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE)
- 50. To see if the Town will vote to accept a gift of two parcels of land totalling approximately 45 acres from Joseph B. Grossman, II. These parcels, which are located west of Mammoth Road and east of Baldwin Hill Road, are shown as parcels 69 and 69-1 on sheet 5 of the Pelham Tax Maps. These parcels are to become part of the Lt. Elmer G. Raymond Memorial Park and shall be known as the Joseph B. Grossman, II addition to that Park.
- 51. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against the budget appropriation indicated herein below, the amount of \$86,840.00, and further to authorize the Selectmen to make prorated reductions in the amounts, if estimated entitlements are reduced, or take any action hereon:
