STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the town will vote to adopt the town budget as prepared by the budget committee, or make any alterations or additions thereto.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,471.50 as the town's share of State Aid construction of highways, or take any other action relative thereto.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$489.84 as the town's share of Town Road Aid for the permanent improvement of Class V roads, as recommended by the budget committee.

5. To see how much money the town will vote to pay on the town debt. (The recommendation of the budget committee is the note due December 1, 1941 of \$668.67, and refund of \$892.50 of the trust funds now used by the town).

6. To see if the town will raise and set apart and appropriate money for the repair of three Class V roads in three sections of the town:

(1) 500 ft. on hill leading to the house of Frank Carleton; 500 ft. adjacent land of James Sexton on road to Salem, N. H.

(2) 500 ft. on the hill near the house of Alice Carleton; 500 ft. on the hill leading to George P. Wood. (3) 500 ft. in North Pelham on Keyes Hill; 500 ft. on Sherburne Hill. The above roads to be repaired with a suitable binder in 1941.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100 for extermination of the Dutch Elm Beetle, or take any other action relative thereto.

8. To see if the town will authorize the payment of firemen on active duty at all chimney and building fires at the same rate as now paid at forest fires.

9. To see if the town will vote to elect only one highway agent next year.

10. To see if the town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars the following highways:

- a. Seavey Hill road, junction of Kate Seavey road to Hudson line.
- b. Road leading from Kate Seavey place to the Farmer place.
- c. Greeley road, from F. A. Greeley orchard to Mammoth road.
- d. Road leading from Nolins pasture bars to Seavey Hill road.
- e. Road leading from corner of road at Dupont place to Baldwin Hill.
- f. Road from corner near Longin Rostoskos place to wall near the camp owned by Walter Remais. If any or all of said highways are closed by affirmative vote to direct the selectmen to carry the same into effect.

11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their annual appraisal in April.

13. To see if the town will vote to grant a discount on the 1941 tax list on all property taxes paid in full, 2 per cent on or before July 15, 1941; one per cent on or before September 1, 1941, or take any other action relative thereto.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



We have had an increase in contagious diseases during the last year, the cases being scattered over the whole town. We have also had ten cases of impetigo during the year and these were also in different sections of the town.

A Dental Clinic sponsored by the P. T. A. was held in April, with transportation provided to Dr. T. J. Welch's office by a number of generous Pelham women. There was a small charge to each child for each treatment.

The P. T. A. sponsored the soup project again this year, and the children who can pay are asked to pay .02 for a generous helping, those who cannot afford to are given some free of charge.

The Red Cross furnished shoes, rubbers and clothing to those in real need.

At Christmas, a number of needy children were remembered by the Grange, and a number of charitably minded people.
