TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough
[L. s.] in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at St. Patrick's Parish Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. A. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

B. To bring in your ballot on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be declared no longer in effect in this Town."

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges and make appropriations for the same, that is, if the Town will vote to accept the Town Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee and to take action thereon.

4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their appraisal in April.

5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.

7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$573.37 as the Town's share of Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$3,822.48 as the State's share, as provided by law.

8. To see if the Town will vote to make the Town Hall available without charge each and every Saturday evening beginning the first Saturday in January, 1957, through the last Saturday in December, 1957, for the recreational purposes of the Pelham Teen Canteen, a young people's group dedicated to creating wholesome recreational opportunities for teenagers. (By Petition)

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of tarring or asphalt mix or other black top surface on McGrath Road for a distance of approximately one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) mile and to be done in the year 1957. (By Petition)

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150.00 to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the 37 other communities in this region, or act in relation thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of graveling and widening the Atwood Road beginning at Rt. 38, thence south to a point known as Hayes Bend on Atwood Road, a distance of about 6-10ths of one mile, or act in relation thereto. (By request of the residents of Atwood Road.)

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for the purpose of graveling and widening the so-called Greely Road, beginning at a point on Mammouth Road and north to a point known as the Glaven and Adams homesteads on Greely Road, a distance of about 5-10ths of one mile, or act in relation thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the purpose of oiling or tarring or otherwise black topping the so-called Cemetery Road or a part thereof.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

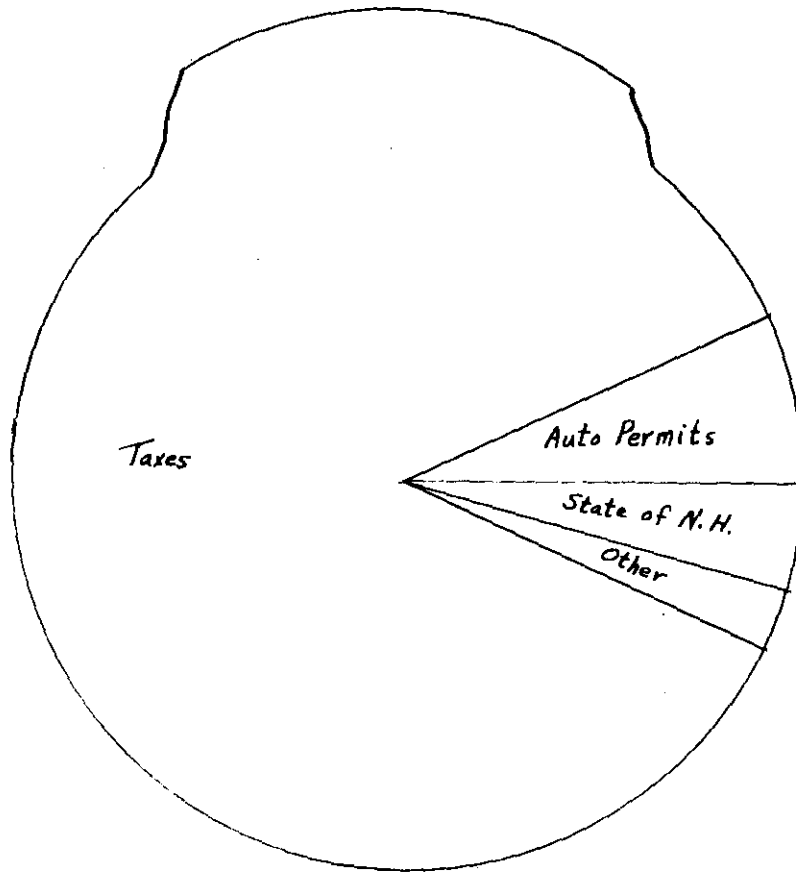

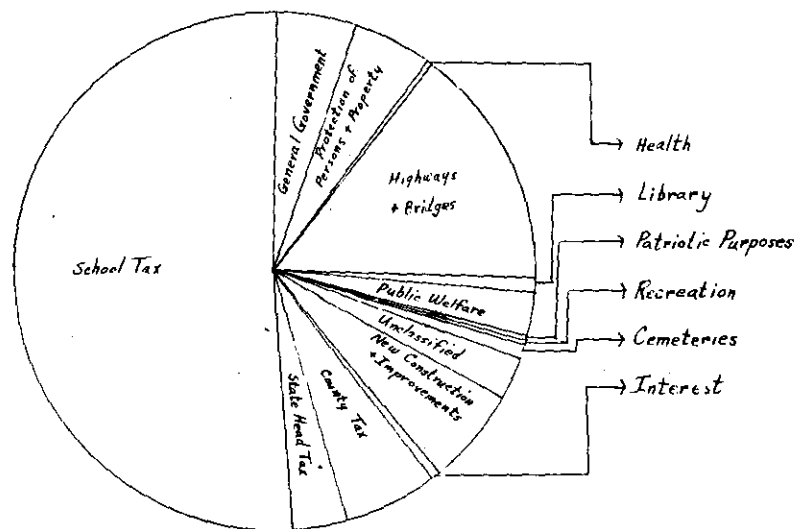

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Pelham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1956, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1955—December 31, 1956:
(Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1955 and December 31, 1956, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the financial condition of the Town changed from a Surplus of \$2,602.72 to a Net Debt of \$5,488.25 during 1956.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1956, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$11,071.31, less a revenue surplus of \$3,354.34, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$7,716.97.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1956, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1956, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all Town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Deficit:

It is noted that the current financial condition of the Town changed from a surplus of \$2,602.72 to a deficit of \$5,488.25 during 1956, as shown herewith:

Good fiscal policy requires that a town's assets be sufficient in amount at all times to meet its current liabilities. It is therefore recommended that provision be made for the liquidation of the current deficit of \$5,488.25. This may be done by making one appropriation for the entire amount or by appropriations for part of the current deficit over a period of years until such time as the liquidation has been completed.

Appropriation Overdrafts and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1956, there was a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$11,071.31. In other words—total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by this amount. However, it is noted that an overdraft of \$2,323.40 occurred in the "overlay" account. Inasmuch as the town meeting does not vote the amount of overlay to be assessed the actual net overdraft of budgetary appropriations was \$8,747.91, as shown herewith:

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (Chapter 32 of the Revised Statutes Annotated) requests were received from the Board of Selectmen and certificates of emergency issued by the Tax Commission under dates of April 2nd and May 4th, 1956 authorizing expenditures in excess of budgetary appropriations on account of snow removal.

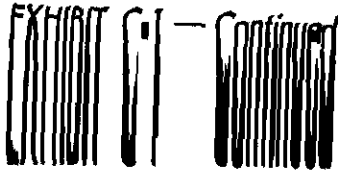

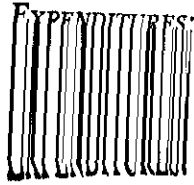

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Pelham qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 23d day of March, 1957 at 12 o'clock noon to act upon the following subjects. The polls shall open at 12 o'clock noon and may not close earlier than 2 P.M.

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the District will vote to construct and equip, at a cost not to exceed \$142,000.00, an addition to the E. G. Sherburne Elementary School with the necessary facilities, including five classrooms, an all purpose room, a new heating plant, a kitchen, and the necessary equipment for said addition; to appropriate the sum of \$142,000.00 for said addition, and to raise the same by the issuance of bonds or serial notes under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Stat-

~~III, Chapter 33, of the Revised Statutes Annotated as amended,~~

to authorize the Pelham School Board to so issue and negotiate said bonds or notes in the name of and on the credit of the District, said Board to have the discretionary powers described in Section 8 of said Chapter 33 in respect to said notes or bonds. Provided, however, if any funds are received for said addition from the United States Government or any department or agency thereof, the State of New Hampshire or any department or agency thereof, or other sources, such funds shall be used to the extent thereof to retire any serial notes or bonds so issued.

10. That if Article 9 is voted in the negative, to see if the District will vote to construct and equip, at a cost not to exceed \$110,000.00, an addition to the E. G. Sherburne Elementary School with the necessary facilities, including six classrooms, a new heating plant, and the necessary equipment for said addition, and to raise the same by the issuance of bonds or serial notes under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, Chapter 33, of the Revised Statutes Annotated as amended; to authorize the Pelham School Board to so issue and negotiate said bonds or notes in the name of and on the credit of the District, said Board to have the discretionary powers described in Section 8 of said Chapter 33 in respect to said notes or bonds. Provided, however, if any funds are received for said addition from the United States Government or any department or agency thereof, the State of New Hampshire or any department or agency thereof, or other sources, such funds shall be used to the extent thereof to retire any serial notes or bonds so issued.

11. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any department or agency thereof, the State of New Hampshire or any department or agency thereof, or other sources.

school board acting alone as required by law and further authorize the school board to execute any or all contracts or agreements necessary in connection with the construction and equipping of said building.

13. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,865.15 as a Deficiency Appropriation; this sum to be made available to the School District prior to June 30, 1957. (\$3,000. - additional teacher, \$2,365.15 - furniture and alterations for additional classroom space, \$2,500. - sewage disposal.)

14. By petition of—Charlotte Gay Vautier, Annis A. Vautier, Peter Morin, and others; To see if the district will vote to extend the school bus route to cover the Dwelly Simpson Road thence from the Dwelly Simpson Road onto the Tallant Road (east) to Bridge Street.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Our defective speech pupils were transported every Tuesday to Hudson for Speech class and several P. T. A. members helped with transportation during the year.

In October, the children that had their first Salk inoculations last May were given their second shots. This clinic took place in Salem, N. H. and 48 attended. In February we had another Salk clinic at the E. G. Sherburne School for the other grades and pre-school children and we inoculated 87 Pre-school children, 138 school children and 8 pregnant mothers. Without the help of capable doctors, nurses and other helpers we could not have such well organized clinics. Mrs. Marie Fahey, R.N., our State Nurse was in charge.

In February we also gave the T. B. Patch Test to the 1st, 5th and 8th grades under the supervision of Mrs. Irene Birchall,

R. N. We took 2 children and 2 adults over to the T. B. clinics for X-Tays and found them free of T. B.

We had our "Registration and Get-Acquainted Day" in May and 43 children attended.

The Grange, the P. T. A., the Legion Auxiliary and the Police Department were very generous with donations of lollipops (used at Salk Clinic), free lunches and free milk for some of our needy children. I would like to thank these organizations for their help.

I want to thank Mr. Ramsay, Mr. McGrath, the Principal and teachers, the parents, and all who contributed to the welfare of our children.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of the Pelham School District:

It gives me pleasure to submit my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

In my last annual report I made the statement that Pelham was experiencing "growing pains"—the ailment has not lessened during the past year, if anything it has become more acute. The School Planning Committee working with your School Board and Superintendent has spent many hours in trying to find a reasonable solution to this problem. I personally wish to commend the Committee as a whole on the wonderful spirit of co-operation which they have shown in their work. Seldom has a group worked as hard and as conscientiously to solve a problem, bearing in mind the common good of every man, woman and child in Pelham. It has been a pleasure to watch this spirit bear fruit in the plans to be presented to you the voters.

The two classrooms in the town hall have progressed fairly well, but at best they are a stop-gap measure which should be alleviated as soon as possible. Just how far you want to go in solving this problem is again your prerogative as voters. I hope that in the final analysis the school children of Pelham will have top priority.

Mr. Charles Juris—B.Ed. Keene Teachers College 1952 to replace Herbert Currier who resigned to accept a teaching position in Littleton, Mass. Mr. Juris teaches English and Social Studies, Grades 7 and 8.

Mr. Dwight Meader—B.A. Gordon College to replace James Caros who resigned to accept a position in Nashua. Mr. Meader teaches Science and Arithmetic, Grades 7 and 8.

Mrs. Lola Ryan—B.Ed. Lowell State Teachers 1940 as additional teacher for combined grades 5 and 6.

Mrs. Mildred Bertrand—Lowell State Teachers, 3 year Diploma 1928 to replace Mrs. Ethel Jewett, Grade 5, who moved to Massachusetts.

Mrs. Constance Gagne who received her Elementary training in England, to replace Mrs. Gertrude Kelly, combined grades 2 and 3. Mrs. Kelly took over the additional Grade 1 section.

Miss Helen Garon—B.Ed., Keene Teachers College 1953, to replace Carol Chabe, grade 3, who resigned December 22 to remain at home.

Although you have added three additional teachers in the past two years because of increased enrollment, there should be an additional two teachers in 1957-58 if you are to maintain good educational practice. A survey of children entering Grade 1 next fall indicates the need for two first grade divisions, the present two first grade divisions will move on to grade 2, thereby four teachers for the first two grades. The following table will best show the needs for 1957-58.

*This program would make possible a more comprehensive departmentalization in grades 7 and 8 and would at the same time free the Principal from full time teaching to allow him time for work on important administrative details. The State Department is recommending a full time Supervising Principal for anything over ten classrooms, while this could free Mr. Juris for less than a half day.

You will note too that this eliminates all combination grades which permits equal educational opportunities to all the children of Pelham.

REPAIRS AND REPLACEMENTS

The renovation of the sewage disposal plant has been the major item in this year's maintenance program. Considering the scope of the work this project was completed with a minimum of expense to the district and has proven very efficient and satisfactory.

Your School Board has wisely followed a procedure of summer maintenance that will prevent little repairs from becoming big expenses. Bill Burnham has done minor repairs, such as sanding and finishing desk tops and replacing linoleum on classroom cabinets that tend to cut down on maintenance costs. Mr. Harry Jack has been most accommodating with his time and efforts in overcoming the usual plumbing problems that are bound to occur now and then. These all make for a better school and are appreciated by your school board and Superintendent.

SCHOOL LUNCH

The School Lunch Program under Mrs. Greenwood, Mrs. Houle and helpers has maintained its usual high standard. Much credit is due the above personnel in their ability to provide a good variety of hot wholesome dinners for your children. It has proven that a good hot lunch program plays an important part in the everyday health of children who participate. Weight charts and attendance records are good indications of this.

INSTRUCTION

Your instructional program under Mr. McGrath's guidance has progressed exceptionally well. As Mr. McGrath's report follows, I shall only say that his work has been of the highest order and that his cooperation and conscientious efforts are greatly appreciated by your Superintendent.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. Juris and

his staff in their efforts to carry out the educational policies of

your School Board and Superintendent. I also wish to thank the School Board, citizens, and pupils for your friendly spirit of cooperation—it has served to make my work worthwhile as well as pleasant.

HELPING TEACHER'S REPORT

I herewith submit my third annual report as Helping Teacher of instruction for the Pelham School District.

ELEMENTARY EDUCATION:

Our departmental reading program has continued to attempt to provide the best readers possible commensurate with each child's ability. The addition of a separate phonics program in grade two for purely experimental purposes is assuredly helping to strengthen this area, and the acquisition of the independence reader, "Tall Tales 3" has helped to complete the three grade approach to reviewing and strengthening learned word analysis and word attack skills before entrance to grade four.

In the intermediate grades, advances were made. Grade four has acquired a transition reader, "Just Imagine" to accompany. This book attempts to aid the youngsters' review and better adjust to the fourth grade reading program. The testing program of mental maturity and achievement as outlined in last year's annual report has helped the teachers with the total advancement of the reading program. A decided lack of proper children's literature available in the *town* area as in the classrooms, or in the school as a whole tends to make this a major problem. I believe the P. T. A. has aided greatly in this respect. Future plans for strengthening the reading readiness program is a must for grade one. New texts and new testing are to be added. Recreatory and study readers should be purchased in the future.

In the area of language arts, great advances have been made. Mechanics and grammar are beginning to take their place in our total language structure program. We hope to be able to add to our language program in grade two, an emphasis on oral language development. We should realize how fortunate we are in having a total dictionary training program in grades 4-8.

Lack of a thoroughly planned program, proper materials, necessary continuity and proper supervision makes our handwriting program an *overall* failure. I recommend some type of a controlled, supervised directed program of continuity.

IN THE ARITHMETIC AREA:

Achievement tests tend to validate the fact that a greater over all advancement to grade level standards is being achieved here than in any other area. We hope to extend the *depth* type of grouping for ability and individual attention in teaching arithmetic in each classroom to replace single grade standards.

The social studies is the broadest area of study in the grades and undoubtedly is the most difficult area in which to measure growth and achievement, in that you are attempting to build attitudes as well as understanding. With the new editions being used, with the wealth of supplementary materials provided we are able to see great evidence of interest and growth by teachers and pupils. It is expected changes will be wrought in next year's total program to better incorporate the study of the community, the state, and the state's relationship to New England.

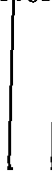
Last year the adoption of an elementary science program was proposed. Teachers and administrators surveyed various programs and the Thurber series was adopted. The reasons for this selection were:

(a) It provided a total accumulation of science concepts, grades 1-6.

(b) It definitely was well grounded for each grade level concerned in readability, planning, concepts, format and interest.

(c) It provided within each text the indirect teaching of as many health concepts as are contained in most health series supplied for classrooms today. Thus, we secured a health-science text as well and eliminated having to purchase a total health program, grades one through eight. This year we purchased for grades 1, 2, 3. Next year we shall purchase for grades 4, 5, 6. There should be much elementary science equipment bought to make this program a visual—doing—program as well as a text program. This equipment is the expensive type and only small quantities can be purchased each year. Future curriculum planning should encompass plans for a workshop in the elementary science for all grades.

I am sure most townspeople are aware of how well Miss



Teresa Grace has provided in the music area. Miss Grace and the teachers should be most highly commended for their continuous and cooperative efforts.

Mrs. Mary Sherburne continues to produce her normal good art program. The pupils and the teachers of this school district are fortunate in having such a well directed art program available.

The success or failure of a child's life often hinges on two factors:

- (a) His home life and upbringing from birth to year 12.
- (b) His schooling from age six to twelve—grades one through six.

These are the crucial and formative years. May I say that your elementary teachers have diligently and conscientiously performed their duties in the classroom situation to help each child educate himself as an individual according to his own ability.

SECONDARY EDUCATION:

The departmentalization of grades 7 and 8 proved an extremely sound decision last year and the "fruits" of the move have begun to manifest themselves within the program of studies. All these efforts will greater aid our students in their transition to the many high schools to which they are tuitioned. An attempt to extend the development reading program into the junior high grades has been made by Mr. Juris and his student teacher. They are using the Scott, Foresman basal readers and the 7-1 development reader, "Parades 7-1". A helpful addition to this program and a possible project for the P. T. A. would be a Rat-O-Meter to help increase speed efficiency and comprehension efficiency. The language program is prospering greatly. Spelling could be included in this area to which my comments under Elementary Education could well apply. A dictionary program of directed study flourishes as part of our language arts program. The newest level controlled readers in our Follett Studies need to be added to both grades 7 and 8. This year, a stronger program in current events has greatly enhanced our social studies program.

Certainly a strong program in junior high mathematics is needed when you consider that a child can progress through high school without receiving further mathematical training other than grades 1 through 8. All aims and objectives for a better

arithmetic program in the junior high should be pin-pointed toward this end.

The boosting of the teaching of seventh and eighth grade science to five full periods a week has shown profit in the learning and concepts the children have gleaned. We are attempting to strengthen this area for the future reference of students in high school. Another possible project for the P. T. A. would be the acquisition of a tape-recorder to use in this area.

The following contemplations concerning the total testing program have been fostered during the year and after experiencing a portion of our previously planned program.

(a) A new readiness testing program in grade 1, probably the Metropolitan Readiness Test—which tests reading and number readiness.

(b) An exclusion of one of the general areas of achievement testing in grades 4, 5, 6, and a diversified staggered testing program to cover one test in social science and one test in science. In grade 8 we have added the administration of the California Interest Inventory Test of Vocational preferences to help them with their problems of high school course and subject selection for grade 9. The results of these are available to students and parents as are the achievement test results in the spring in the areas of Reading, Arithmetic, and Language.

Possible improvements of the junior high program would be:

(a) Allowing some physical education to take place with *all* students if the new All-Purpose room is built.

(b) The addition of directed speech and dramatic activities to our language area if the All-Purpose room is built.

(c) If a woman is added to the junior high area, health and vocational guidance classes can be added to the total program with a man handling the boys, and a woman teaching the girls.

(d) An all school library, but particularly one useful to the junior high grades in order to attempt to better teach with a unit approach which will give a better provision for individual differences at level seven and eight.

(e) A possible science laboratory table to enable an approach to science in the “doing” and “seeing” area as well as the “book l’arnin’ ” approach.

(f) An increase in the language arts program to include two periods or more a week above the allotted five for remedial read-

ing help or developmental reading aid *dependent* upon the need

of each individual pupil.

We should all be proud of the job we are doing, parents, townspeople, school board, superintendent, teachers, etc.

Let us not forget the teachers, they are the ones who carry out all that is planned and offered. They are the "soldiers in the trenches." Too often the "generals" of strategy forget this. I commend them all for trying as they all have. Thank you again for your support, understanding and cooperation in all our endeavors covering the instructional program.

The Pelham School Board has held regular monthly meetings, now scheduled for the first Monday of the month; attended Budget Meetings; attended the Supervisory District No. 27 meetings as well as special Supervisory meetings; attended meetings with the School Planning Committee as voted at the School District Meeting, March 31, 1956.

Through investigations and reports of the Superintendent, the school board has offered recommendations for the correction of all complaints, requests and suggestions brought to its attention.

The board has purchased supplementary reading books for the lower grades, using monies from the Clement Fund, and wishes to commend the Pelham Parent-Teacher Association for the school library project they are sponsoring this year.

The board commends Superintendent Louis Ramsay and our Principal, Charles Juris, for the reorganization and set-up of an efficient school system; Helping Teacher John McGrath for curriculum planning and for instuting a fine Science and Language Program; Miss Teresa Grace, for instilling within our children music appreciation; Mrs. Mary Sherburne, Art Director, for her projects and exhibits; Mrs. Anna Horskins, School Nurse, for excellent health supervision; Cafeteria Workers for their efficient operation of the Hot Lunch Program despite crowded conditions which necessitate serving meals in three shifts; teachers for their conscientious work toward educating our children.

Due consideration was given to the welfare of our children when the existing classroom emergencies arose and the board wishes to thank the Fire Warden and wards for their consideration and recommendations at this time; the Selectmen for their cooperation and continued help concerning emergency classrooms at the Town Hall; Budget Committee for its patience and understanding of our needs and requests during the temporary classroom and sewerage emergencies.

The need for additional classrooms to meet the needs of our growing population is a major problem today. The board wishes to commend the School Planning Committee, Superintendent, Louis Ramsay, and Architect, Irving W. Hersey for their consci-

entious and untiring effort to bring to the citizens of Pelham a

report and a proposed solution for our school and classroom needs. Let us acknowledge these needs, and provide to the best of our ability, the best future education and facilities for our children.
