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AN ACT

To Be Known as the Municipal Budget Act

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in  
General Court convened:*

1. *Municipal Budget Act.* At the annual town meeting next after the taking effect of this act, each town in the state shall by ballot vote on the following article to be inserted in the warrant: "To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act." If the majority of those present and voting at said meeting vote for its adoption, this act shall be in force at the next annual town meeting and remain in force in said town until by proper article in the warrant the town shall at a regular town meeting by majority vote rescind such action. In towns where this act is not adopted as above provided, on petition of ten legal voters of said town the selectmen shall insert in the warrant for any subsequent annual town meetings a similar article, which shall be voted on in the manner above provided, and if adopted said act shall remain in force until rescinded by a majority vote at a regular town meeting.

2. *Budget Committee.* In towns adopting the provisions of this act the budget committee shall consist of three, six, nine or twelve members at large as the meeting adopting the provisions of this act shall by vote determine and one member chosen by the school committee of each school district in said town and one member of the board of selectmen to be designated by said board. The members at large may either be appointed by the moderator or elected by the town meeting adopting this act as said meeting may by vote determine. The majority of the members at large shall be property taxpayers. If said members at large are selected by election it shall be by a majority vote by ballot or acclamation of those present and voting. Where said members at large are appointive such appointment shall be made within thirty days after the adoption of this act by the town meeting. One third of the members at large so elected or appointed shall hold office for

one year, one third for two years and one third for three years or until their successors are elected and qualified. The places of those members at large whose terms have expired shall be filled in accordance with the terms of the original vote of said town meeting unless the town shall at some subsequent meeting change the method of selection. The members selected by the school committee and the selectmen shall hold office for one year or until their successors are elected and qualified.

3. *Preparation of Budget.* It shall be the duty of the budget committee to prepare a budget according to forms prescribed by the tax commission for town and school expenditures, and for this purpose to hold public hearings, notice of which shall be given at least seven days in advance. The budget committee shall consult the selectmen, school committee, and other town officers and departments as to the costs of government, revenue anticipated and services performed, and it shall be the duty of any town or school officer or employee to furnish information required by said committee. It shall also be the duty of all boards of selectmen and of school committees of each town to prepare and submit to the budget committee of the town an itemized statement of expected receipts and expenditures for the ensuing year at such time as said budget committee shall fix. When completed the budget shall be printed in the town report or separately and distributed or published in some newspaper printed or circulated in said town at least one week before the town or school meeting. In any town where a budget committee has not been authorized, the selectmen shall perform the duties of said committee in relation to town expenditures.

4. *Limitation.* So long as the provisions of this act shall remain in force in any town the total amount appropriated at any annual town or school meeting shall not exceed by more than ten per cent the total amount specified in the budget for town or school purposes and no appropriation shall be made for any purpose not included in said budget.

5. *Exceeding Appropriations.* In towns adopting the provisions of this act, no board of selectmen, school board or other spending agency shall pay or agree to pay any money or incur any liability involving the expenditures of money for any purpose for which an appropriation has not been made, or in excess of any appropriation or allotment made to it except for the purpose of paying judgments rendered against a town or school district, provided, however, that in case of sudden and unexpected emergency

the selectmen may on application to the tax commission and the school board on application to the state board of education after hearing be given a certificate of emergency authorizing them to make such expenditures or incur such liability; provided, further, that in cases arising during the year following a town meeting where changes occur which make it unnecessary to use the amount appropriated for a specific purpose, an unexpended balance may be transferred by boards of selectmen or school boards from one appropriation to another, provided the total amount expended for all purposes does not exceed the total amount appropriated at town or school meetings for all purposes.

6. *Penalty.* Any person or persons violating the provisions of the preceding section shall be subject to removal from office on proper petition brought before the superior court. Such petition shall take precedence of other actions pending in said court, and shall be heard and decided as speedily as possible.

7. *Takes Effect.* All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed and this act shall take effect upon its passage.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday the twelfth day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same. *72*
3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate, and set apart for town maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year. *Must raise 128 1/2 by tax, raise 2500, other taxes*
4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department for the ensuing year. *500*
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department for the ensuing year. *800*

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law,
9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Cemeteries for the ensuing year.
10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on the Town Debt.
12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to pay the interest on Town Notes.

**ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT**

Dear Sir:

I submit herewith a report of an audit of the accounts of the Town of Pelham, N. H. The following exhibits are enclosed:

1. Lucy L. Koehler, Tax Collector, Pelham, N. H. Summary of Warrant, 1933 Tax Levy, Payments to Treasurer, 1933 Tax Levy, Uncollected Poll and Property Tax Lists of Levy of 1933.
2. George P. Wood, Town Clerk, Pelham, N. H. Receipts and Payments February 1, 1933 to March 1, 1934, Auto Permits and Dog Licenses.
3. George P. Wood, Treasurer of Trustees of Trust Funds, Treasurer of Trustees of the Cemeteries, Pelham, N. H. Receipts and Payments for Fiscal Year 1933.
4. Carl M. Mansfield, Treasurer, Pelham, N. H. Reconciliation of Cash Book and Bank Balance for Fiscal Year 1933.

In general, the accounts and records of all town officers seemed to be kept in accordance with the recommended accounting practice and no irregularities of major importance were observed.

I offer a few comments and suggestions which should be helpful in keeping the future records more in accord with general practice.

1. Road Agent's Payroll. On town maintenance work, signatures should be obtained from the men when they receive their money. On State Highway Payrolls signatures of employees should be obtained on Payrolls except in the case of State Aid Maintenance and Trunk Line Maintenance. State Treasurer's checks are sent to each individual employee for State Aid Maintenance and Trunk Line Maintenance work and therefore it is not necessary to obtain signature as payment is made directly by the State and no expenditures of town funds is involved.

2. Trustee of Trust Funds. All trust funds were found to agree with Trustees' Records, except that of Arthur N. Gage Fund, dated February 15, 1917, a Town Note, Face of note read for \$100.00 while town record showed this should be written for \$150.00. There was also an accrued surplus of \$42.01 on the Amoskeag Savings Bank Funds not shown on Trustees' Report. In the checking account at the Union Old Lowell National Bank, there is an accumulated interest of \$76.70, not shown on Trustees' Report. In reporting next year I recommend a summary of all accounts of Trust Funds by totals at end of list, with an account of surplus and interest.
3. In order that the selectmen's receipts may show a true record, the treasurer should give a list of all receipts to selectmen once a month at meeting day of town officers.
4. The tax collector's account for 1933, shows a slight overpayment of \$4.98 which may be due to some mistake in the uncollected list. A recheck of this uncollected list by Mrs. Koehler will undoubtedly correct this account.

*To the Citizens of Pelham:*

At the district school meeting on March 24, 1934, the School Board together with the Pelham chairman of selectmen and the representative to the general court, were appointed as a committee to study the matter of consolidation of the public schools of Pelham.

During the year this committee has held several meetings and has spent one day in visiting consolidated schools in southern New Hampshire. On this day they visited consolidated schools in Hampstead, Candia, Raymond, Greenland, and Rye, and talked with the superintendents and school board members of these several schools. On February 14, this committee has arranged for a meeting with the Pelham Parent Teacher Association at which time an architect will give an illustrated lecture on modern school construction which will consist of type of buildings, and construction and equipment of buildings.

In the event of consolidation, there would have to be constructed a building at the Center of not less than four rooms to accommodate the children in the five one-room schools which are now operating.

This building could assume one of two forms; either an addition to the present Junior High building, or the construction of a separate four-room building in the immediate vicinity of the present Junior High School building.

In its consideration, your committee studied the following problems:

1. The number of children in each grade in all of the schools in Pelham and the present prospects of the number to enter each grade for the next few years.

*Incumbent*

2. The transportation of all the children attending school in the town to the Center. At the present time there is a school bus carrying children to the seventh and eighth grades from each of the four outlying districts of the town. If all of the children were transported it would not be necessary to have any additional lines but it would be necessary to have full-sized school buses to accommodate these children. It is believed that it would be possible for two buses to properly handle the transportation of all of the children; each bus making two trips, one bus mak-

ing a trip to Gage Hill and to Curriers, as is now done, and the other bus making a trip to Gumpus and to North Pelham. Your committee was informed on its visit to consolidated schools, that most of the buses made at least two and in several cases three separate trips from different sections of the town to the consolidated school. It was told also that attendance at the consolidated school was much improved since all the children, not only those who lived beyond the mileage limit as formerly, have a chance to ride to school. This opportunity has been greatly appreciated by parents who at first objected to the idea of their young children going so far to school when the new system was under discussion.

3. Cost. In considering the cost of the construction and upkeep of a new modern building, your committee has first taken into consideration the required repairs on present school buildings. Within the next five to ten years, considerable money must be laid out on the five rural buildings now in use. These buildings must be painted inside and out. Within that time most of the buildings need to be shingled. Three of the buildings will have to have new ceilings. The woodsheds and present toilet facilities will have to be greatly renovated or entirely rebuilt, these buildings at the present time being in very poor condition.

Four of the rural schools should have installed sanitary toilets and it is entirely possible that they may be required to install these in the near future. The facilities for obtaining proper water for drinking and cleaning purposes is very poor in each of the rural schools.

Should a new building be constructed, the matter of water, heat, and toilet facilities would be combined in one unit and the cost of installation and maintenance would be less than providing the same facilities in five separate buildings. It is a question with your committee in regard to the recommendation for immediate consolidation. It is probably true that cost of construction is materially cheaper at the present time than what it will be three or four years hence. The prevailing tendency not only in New England but thruout the country is toward consolidation of rural schools, brot about by the desire for efficiency. Today the most powerful factor for improving rural schools is consolidation. It means a wider use of the school plant and social, educational and economic advancement.

May we call attention to the fact that all indebtedness of the Town for the present Junior High School will be met July 1935 when final payment on the School Bonds will be made.

Two or three of the superintendents contacted during the tour of consolidated schools emphasized the fact that scholarship had materially increased since their schools had been consolidated, that there had been effected a considerable saving in the use of books and supplies where their use was combined in one building and that better transportation facilities more than offset the extra distance which some children were required to travel from their homes. Superintendents and school board members alike emphasize the fact that many parents opposed to consolidation previous to its actual operation were now very enthusiastic supporters of the consolidated system due to the extra opportunities and educational facilities which were available to their boys and girls.

The Superintendent of Schools in Candia, N. H. has written regarding the Candia consolidated School as follows:

"Consolidation has eliminated the cost of one teacher with a pupil enrollment continuing as large as that of the previous year. It has reduced the number of grades to two in each room, has lengthened the subject periods of instruction under teachers particularly trained for their grades, and has permitted the exchange of expensive teaching materials that formerly had to be duplicated for the use of each school. Consolidation has made possible by an exchange of classes a progressive course in music, conducted in all grades by one of the regular teachers."

*Yravis* "Pupil transportation facilities, demanded by centralization, have been extended to one hundred ten children where formerly less than twenty-five were accommodated. Consequently the current cost of elementary schools has been raised approximately one thousand dollars. On the other hand by the consolidation of schools and the improvement of facilities the allotment of state aid actually received by Candia this year (1934) was increased from \$1,349.81 to \$2,664.07." *difference = \$1,315.26*

Your committee respectfully submits this as their report in the fulfillment of their duties which were assigned them by the last school district meeting. This committee further wishes to urge every interested citizen to study and think about the matter of consolidation and the extra opportunities which it offers for the development and enrichment of the life of every boy and girl in this town.

Your committee further recommends that a committee be appointed for further study and that this committee submit its findings, including an organized plan for consolidation con-

sisting of all the details in regard to type and cost of building and the method and cost of transportation, in the school district meeting in March, 1936.

There was one change in the teaching staff at the beginning of the school year in September, Miss Gertrude Cousins being elected to fill the vacancy in the Gage Hill school caused by the resignation of Miss Elizabeth Murphy. In October Miss Mildred Shunaman, a graduate of Keene Normal School, was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Evangeline Kearns in the Currier school. The teachers in the other schools are continuing the efficient service which has characterized their work for several years.

Again I wish to call attention to the interest and cooperation which has been shown by the Parent Teacher Association in regard to the welfare of our Pelham schools.

The committee appointed at the last school meeting to study consolidation, has put in considerable time and thought in attempting to determine what will be best for the future welfare of the boys and girls of Pelham. I believe that this committee should be enlarged and continued for another year with authorization and instruction to make an effort to secure federal aid under the federal relief program for the construction of a consolidated school in Pelham.

Should it be possible to secure worth while federal or state aid, this committee should be authorized to call a special meeting of the school district. Should it be impossible to secure federal aid during the coming year, this committee should have instruction to present a plan for the future development of the Pelham schools, at the regular school meeting in 1936.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

Pelham, New Hampshire

*To the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board and Citizens of Pelham:*

I present my report as school nurse from February 1, 1934 to February 1, 1935.

In October Dr. Robert B. Kerr of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association examined fifty-four school children and said that he found the general appearance of them better than it was a year ago. Dr. Kerr said that in all probability the milk and soup served in school had helped many. The important findings of Dr. Kerr were reported to the parents. Dr. Kerr recommended that thirteen of these children have their tonsils removed. Ten children had them removed under the Child Recovery Program.

Cod liver oil, furnished by the state welfare organization, is being distributed by your school nurse.

During the early months of the year hot soup was served in all schools and the pupils enjoyed it. The Parent-Teacher Association in conjunction with the School Board furnished the necessary heating and cooking utensils. I regret that no free soup was available in the latter months and the number able or willing to purchase soup is very small.

Milk was furnished during most of the school year by the state welfare organization.

Again the Red Cross has furnished clothing to the needy and thus kept children in school who would otherwise be absent.

The well near the Junior High School has been put in order and the water analyzed and found to be good. Both the Junior High and Center schools are using water from this well.
