## TOWN WARRANT

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillshorough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount of money necessary to secure State aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the law passed January session 1905.
4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, and determine in what manner the same shall be expended.
5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the extermination of moths and beetles.
6. To choose two persons for three years for Trustees of Cemeteries.

7. To choose one person for three years for Trustee of the Public Library.

8. To choose one person for three years as Trustee of the Trust Funds of the Town.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise, in addition to the amount required by law, for the Public Library.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the observance of "Old Home Day."

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries for the ensuing year.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the blank inventories when they make their annual appraisal in April.

14. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent on 1919 taxes paid before Sept. 1, 1919.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town School District of the Town of Pelham, qualified to vote in District affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District, on Saturday, the fifteenth day of March, 1919 at half-past one o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
7. To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools.
8. To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for the tuition of pupils attending High Schools or Academies.

9. To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for text-books and supplies for the ensuing year.

10. To see how much money the District will raise and appropriate for the repair of school houses for the ensuing year.

11. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer or Officers and District Clerk and all other District Officers.

12. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to contract with the Nashua High School, or some other equal grade to furnish instruction to its scholars for the ensuing year.

13. To see how much money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for its seventh and eighth grade school.

14. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to unite with one or more town districts or special districts, to form a supervisory district, for the purpose of employing a superintendent of the public schools therein, under provisions of Chapter 77 of the Session Laws of New Hampshire, 1899, and to raise money to carry such vote into effect.

15. To see if the District will vote to build a school house at Pelham Center, and furnish suitable grounds for its higher grades, or for a central school for the entire District, and if voted in the affirmative, appoint committees to raise and appropriate money to carry the same into effect.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
