## TOWN WARRANT.

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{ L. S. } THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE..

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsboro in said State, Qualified to Vote in Town Affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Pelham, on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what disposition the Town will make of the literary fund for the ensuing year.
4. To see what disposition the Town will make of the dog fund for the ensuing year.
5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for school purposes for the ensuing year.
6. To choose one person for Trustee of Public Library for three years.
7. To choose two persons for Trustees of Cemeteries for three years.

8. To see how much money, if any, the Town will vote to raise for the Public Library for the year ensuing, in addition to the amount required by law.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for cemeteries for the year ensuing.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise to pay on the town debt for the year ensuing.

11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of highways for the year ensuing.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

13. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent. on taxes on 1900 list that are paid before Sept. 1st, 1900.

14. To see if the Town will vote to accept and care for the cemetery in the north part of the town.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept and adopt Chapter 29 of the pamphlet laws of 1899, the same being an act in amendment of and in addition to Chapter 73 of the Public Statutes, relating to the repairs of highways in towns.

16. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

TOWN OF PELHAM FOR THE YEAR ENDING

MARCH 1, 1900.

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The time has arrived when it again becomes necessary for the School Board, in compliance with the statutes of the state, to report the condition of the public schools. At the commencement of the school year it was little thought that the duties of making out the annual report of the condition of the public schools of this town would devolve upon other than the superintendent elected at the commencement of the year. But the ways of an over-ruling Providence have otherwise ordered. In the loss of Rev. Augustus Berry the public have lost one who always at all times had the best interests and welfare of all the children who attended, and who were under his supervision. It is but just to say that his place will be hard to fill, and the suggestions and methods which he embodied in former school reports will always be good for reference in the coming years.

## SCHOOL HOUSES.

Our school houses are all in fairly good repair. No. 2 has been reshingled the past year, with no especial

appropriation, the Board considering that five per cent. of the school money would be sufficient for repairs the past year. The coming year it will be necessary to re-shingle the house at School No. 5, and also make some repairs on the piazza of the same house. The houses at Schools Nos. 1 and 3 should have a coat of paint; it would be economy to paint them before another year.

### THE PAST YEAR.

We have had thirty-three weeks of school, divided into three terms of equal length. In our judgment this is the right number of weeks to have in a school year. The estimate of the work for the past year is, that it has been a successful and prosperous year. Good work has been accomplished and we thank the teachers for their labors; they have been diligent and untiring in their efforts. Good progress has been made in all the studies undertaken, and the teachers without any exception have been fully alive to their duties. The want of sufficient volume of voice on the part of the scholars was a prominent failing in one or two of the schools at the closing exercises—answers from a large proportion of the pupils were so low as not to be audible across the school room. This we trust will be remedied in the future, as we have every reason to believe that these children can speak up when occasion requires.

The attendance of the scholars has not perhaps been quite so good the past year as in some previous years.

This is to be regretted. When a scholar is absent, if only for a half day or a day, it makes a break in the class and in the lessons. I fully agree with our late superintendent, who in his last report said, that when a pupil had been absent, that on his return the teacher should insist upon his making up the lessons that he had lost; of course, if sickness is the cause there is some excuse for the scholar. In School No. 1, the Spring term was abbreviated about ten days on account of so many pupils being sick, and the same school suffered to some extent the last term on account of a throat epidemic.

What we want in our schools is to have our children's mind increase in strength, and have them come in contact with that which is good and true. In short, we desire them to become true men and women. And the greatest power to accomplish this outside the home is the teacher. Children absorb that which they hear and see, as a sponge does water, hence the importance of hearing nothing but the best language and seeing nothing but the most courteous actions. Let us visit the schools during the term and see for ourselves if our children are getting all out of the schools that they can, and by so doing encourage the teacher and pupils in their labors.

The amount expended for school supplies is about double that of the previous year. The reason of this was that several new books of reference have been purchased, and a large number of the old text books were so badly worn that they have had to be replaced with new ones.



In conclusion, I will say to all citizens of Pelham, let us do all that lays in our power to make our schools a success; let us visit them and encourage the teachers and scholars. Suffer not your interest to flag in the least degree, but rather let it be stimulated into ever increasing zeal, to advance the prosperity of our public schools.

## STATISTICS.

The school year was 33 weeks, divided into three equal terms. School No. 1 was abbreviated one and one-half weeks in the Spring term on account of sickness. School No. 4, the Spring term was made 12 weeks to make up for one week lost in the previous year.

## ATTENDANCE AND STUDIES.

SCHOOL No. 1.—First term, 23 scholars; second, 23; third, 29; for the year, 29—8 boys and 21 girls. Average attendance, 19.

All attended to reading, spelling, penmanship, arithmetic and vocal music; 20 to geography, 14 to grammar, 13 to history and drawing, 9 to physiology, 5 to book-keeping and 4 to composition.

SCHOOL No. 2.—First term, 31 scholars; second, 31; third, 28; for the year, 31—16 boys and 15 girls. Average attendance, 25.

All attended to reading, spelling, penmanship, arithmetic, drawing and vocal music; 27 to geography, 22 to grammar, 21 to history, 6 to physiology, 6 to book-keeping, and 7 to algebra.

SCHOOL No. 3.—First term, 20 scholars; second, 21; third, 23; for the year, 23—8 boys and 15 girls. Average attendance, 14.

All attended to reading, spelling, penmanship, arithmetic, drawing and vocal music; 18 to geography, 16 to grammar, 9 to history, 21 to physiology, 2 to book-keeping, 5 to algebra, and 16 to composition.

SCHOOL No. 4.—First term, 18 scholars; second, 15; third, 13; for the year, 18—9 boys and 9 girls. Average attendance, 12.

All attended to reading, spelling, penmanship, arithmetic, drawing and vocal music; 9 to geography, 7 to grammar, 7 to history, 4 to physiology, and 7 to composition.

SCHOOL No. 5.—First term, 15 scholars; second, 14; third, 16; for the year, 16—9 boys and 7 girls. Average attendance, 12.

All attended to reading, spelling, penmanship, arithmetic and drawing, 13 to geography, 13 to grammar, 6 to history, 1 to algebra, and 13 to composition.

The amount expended for teachers and miscellaneous expenses, \$1767.45. The amount for school supplies, \$145.75. Number of scholars attending school during the year, 117—50 boys and 67 girls. Expense per scholar for teaching and miscellaneous expenses, \$13.91; for school supply per scholar, \$1.24.

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TRUSTEES' REPORT.  
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In making their annual report the library trustees feel that it needs must be a brief one for the year, although a successful one, has been marked by no events of special moment in the history of the library.

The number of books added by the trustees for the past year has fallen somewhat below the average, only 84 new books having been bought, this number being as many as we thought it prudent to purchase considering the amount of money in the treasury.

Many books of much literary value have been presented to the library for which we are very thankful.

We are indeed truly grateful for the manifest trust the people seem to have in our ability to select suitable books, for only two or three lists of books have been handed in during the past year. We should be better pleased if the people showed more interest in this direction, but enough has already been said on this subject in our past reports and I suppose if others are satisfied we shouldn't find fault.

The choice of books for a public library is rather an important matter. First, because it *does* make a difference what kind of literature is furnished a public to read. Second, because the manifestly prevailing taste of said public must in a measure be satisfied, and third, because of the small number of books we are limited to and the very large number to be selected from, many of them being less valuable than the paper upon which they are written. If any of the latter class should be found in our purchases it is due solely to an error of judgment not to wilful neglect, for we endeavor to get only the best.

We would gladly see the number of volumes in the library increase more rapidly, but for the present, I suppose we must content ourselves with a slow but steady growth and indeed I think the library has done very well considering the time it has been in existence, and we see no reason why this steady growth is not assured for the future.

We again express our thanks for the efficient services of the librarian and a hope that she will continue to serve the library for the ensuing year.

With sincere thanks to the friends of the library for their good offices and hoping that their number may increase, this report is respectfully submitted.
