#### TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in the Town . Iffairs:

#### [L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose one person for three years as Selectman of said town, one person for three years as Trustee of Trust Funds, one person for three years as Trustee of the Public Library, two persons for three years as Trustees of Cemeteries, and to choose all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray cown charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
- 3 To see if the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart, the amount necessary for the maintenance of State Vid highways as recommended by the State Highway Commissioner.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount necessary to acquire State Aid for the construction and permanent improvement of highways
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart for town maintenance of highway, and bridges.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,300,00 to purchase a tractor-grader with snow-plow attachments, or to take any other action relating to snow removal.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,000.00 this year and a like sum next year, on condition that the state contribute the sum of \$4,000.00 each of the two years mentioned for permanent improvement of the Mammoth Road, so-called, as provided in an Act now before the Legislature, the same to apply to such portion of said Mammoth Road now unimproved, and to take any other action relative thereto.
- 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control, to be spent in co-operation with the State Forestry Department.
- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department for the ensuing year.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to sell the chassis of the Model T Ford of the Chemical Fire truck now in use and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$600 to purchase a new chassis in place thereof, and if voted in the affirmative to appoint a committee to carry the same into effect, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$240.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise as aid for the town poor for the ensuing year, and make appropriation therefor.
- 14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.
- 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries for the ensuing year.
- 16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on the town debt.

- 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 19. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their annual appraisal in April.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 2 per cent on the 1931 tax list paid on or before September 1, 1931.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### **AUDITORS' REPORT**

We, the undersigned Auditors of the Town of Pelham, certify that we have examined the books of the selectmen, treasurer, tax collector, town clerk, treasurer of trust funds and treasurer of cemetery trustees. We find the selectmen have issued orders on the treasurer to the amount of \$34,216.34 and said orders were properly receipted. That the treasurer has received from various sources \$36,691.84, and has paid the above mentioned orders, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$2,475.50. The collector has \$4,366.71 of the 1930 taxes to collect. The town clerk has paid the treasurer \$1,133.10 for auto permits of which \$381.38 is for 1930 permits and \$751.72 is for 1931 permits. He has paid to the treasurer \$317.80 for dog taxes.

The treasurer of the Trust Funds has a balance on hand of \$872.32. The treasurer of the Cemetery Trustees has a balance of \$4.49 on hand.

The total amount of trust funds is \$7,942.50.



#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Pelham qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the twenty-first day of March, 1931 at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

It is with pleasure that I have served this year as superintendent of your schools, and I wish to congratulate you upon the type of schools which you are maintaining. I believe that much credit is due Miss Clement for the vast amount of work which she did during the summer in redecorating and beautifying the school rooms of the district. The type of work which can be carried on, and the results obtained are much higher in well-arranged rooms than in those of inferior condition.

Only one change in the teaching force was necessary, and Miss Elizabeth Bannigan was secured to take charge of the elementary school at the Center, in place of Miss Condrad who resigned.

Later in the year, standard graduation examinations will be given and the results used by the teachers to assist them in making recommendations for promotions at the close of the year.

For next year, I am recommending the introduction of a course in general science in the seventh and eighth grades, and of changing the present eighth grade mathematics course to one in Junior business training.

I wish to congratulte the school board and parents for the interest which they are showing in the schools as manifest in

the organization of the Parent Teachers' Associations, and hope that these associations will function as a benefit to the schools and as a meeting-place where parents may become well-acquainted with the school work, and assist in providing those facilities which cannot be provided by the school district, but which are beneficial in furthering the educational program of our children.

I wish to thank the teachers for the co-operation which they have given me in becoming acquainted with the school work of your town. I wish to thank the school board, parents, and other interested citizens for the splendid way in which they have co-operated with the teachers, for it is through this co-operation that desired results are being obtained. I wish to urge the parents to more frequently visit their schools and see at first hand the work which is being accomplished.

#### REPORT OF HEADMASTER

Mr. Fred W. Hall, Superintendent of Schools, and Pelham School Board.

#### Citizens of Pelham:

I hereby submit, with pleasure, my fifth annual report concerning the accomplishments and social activities of Pelham High school for the past year.

The enrollment at the beginning of the school year was twelve; eight pupils enrolled in the ninth grade and four in the tenth.

The curriculum for the two high school classes is as follows:

The class in fundamentals consist of a study of the fundamentals; arithmetic, spelling, geography and history. English, the foremost study, is stressed emphatically both in oral and written forms.

One of the greatest problems confronting our schools along and combined with their educational training is that of character training. This is accomplished only through the combined efforts of parents and teachers. A cooperation of these factors must be had and in some cases we are glad to say has been obtained. Lack of courtesy, politeness and respectfulness in the home and in public reflects on



the school which in many cases is not entirely responsible. We, the teachers, desire the public to know that much effort has been and is being made to impress a sense of honor and courtesy in each pupil, the citizens of tomorrow. We seek your co-operation.

I am very pleased to state that up to date there have been only three tardinesses in the high school. This is a great improvement over last year, and a very determining factor in the standard of our school.

The high school inspector, as well as the pupils and teachers, greatly appreciate the effort, on the part of the school board and townspeople for the numerous and necessary improvements, especially the chemical toilets.

The regular supervision of our school nurse has meant more for the physical good of the individual pupil and the school than many realize. The higher per cent of attendance which has been most obvious in my last two years of principalship is a proof of this.

The financial condition of the school has as usual been sustained by annual plays and the selling of Crowell Publishing Company's magazines. The money has been beneficially expended on a small school library which the present pupils hope will be enlarged in the future. The students also have purchased all athletic equipment for the playground.

Frequent assembly periods are being conducted by classes and we trust are of educational interest and help to all.

The teachers of Pelham High school extend thanks to the superintendent, to the school board, and to the parents and the other citizens of Pelham for their support and confidence in us.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the School Board and Citizens of Pelham:

Following is the report of the school nurse for 1930:

The marked improvement in the condition of the school buildings has been an inspiration to both teachers and pupils and has helped wonderfully in encouraging the children in habits of personal cleanliness and neatness. They seem to take more pride than formerly in helping to keep their surroundings clean and orderly. The health of the school children has been good.

On May first Dr. Robert Kerr, Executive Secretary of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association held a clinic for underweight children and others desiring to attend. He examined forty persons, and gave all valuable advice. Several afterward attended the clinic in Nashua and have been benefited.


Dr. Weaver of the State Board of Health visited all the schools in May and vaccinated forty-five children. Dr. Weaver said that he found that both the children and school property showed marked improvement since his previous visit.

In November a number of children were operated for removal of tonsils at the County Hospital.

Improved toilet facilities are needed in all schools except the Junior High and Gumpers. The water supply is a problem but constant effort is being made to find good water near each school.
