- 11. To see if the Town will vote to choose one or more persons as Assessors, to act in conjunction with the Selectmen in the appraisal of property and assessment of taxes. If voted in the affirmative, to choose such person or persons by ballot.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to erect where required, and repair any guideboards now in Town. If voted in the affirmative, to raise and appropriate money for the same and determine in what manner the same shall be carried into effect.
 - 13. To see if the Town will vote to build a Town Half



The Library has, during the past year, been patronized by a larger number than ever before in its history. The increase in patronage has been over 300 more volumes than last year and this steady increase in the use of the library shows the appreciation of our people of the privileges they enjoy. The books have been selected from lists handed in by those interested in books and by the librarian and the trustees earnestly request all interested to hand in lists of the books they desire.

During the past year, Charles Wheeler of Lowell, Mass., a former resident of our town, who was very much interested in the library and was a liberal contributor in its construction, has passed away. His daughter presented the library some interesting books and mounted specimens of birds, and we extend to her our thanks for them.

There should be an appropriation for the library sufficient to procure at least 200 volumes a year. We think it best to have some minor repairs on the library building this coming year; new curtains and perhaps some tinting and whitening of the walls, to keep the building in the condition suitable for its purpose.

The interest in the library is an elevating influence

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in a little town like ours and a sure sign of progress and tends to a better people and a better town.


