Minutes of Town Meeting March 13, 1969

Excepting sections appearing elsewhere in this Town Report.

Moderator, James Fenton, opened the meeting at 7:45.

The Budget was taken up item by item and the final figure voted as the total Town Budget was \$229.474.25.

Article 11, transferring Parcel #1, consisting of 52 acres, more or less, of Town Owned land to the Pelham School District, was passed.

Article 12, proposing to purchase a tract of land across from the Memorial School for the future use of a Police/Fire Station was voted to be passed over.

Article 13, seeking to raise a sum of money to construct a Police/Fire Station was voted to be passed over.

Article 14, was amended to read "to see if the town will authorize the Moderator to establish and appoint a committee to investigate and recommend to the town possible sites for the establishment of a municipal building site; and direct that the report of this committee be returned prior to the next town meeting. The report shall include a recommendation for an appropriation to acquire a suitable site, and a recommendation for a building program for any required municipal buildings." This was passed in the affirmative.

Article 16, seeking to have the Highway Agent appointed by the Board of Selectmen, was voted to be passed over.

Article 17, seeking to establish a leash law, was passed.

Article 18, proposing that the Selectmen appoint a committee of three to study and prepare a report on the poor telephone service afforded the Town by the New England Telephone Company, for presentation by the committee to Governor Walter Peterson with a request that he intercede with the State Department of Public Utilities on behalf of the residents of the Town of Pelham, was passed.

Article 19, proposed Zoning changes, was defeated at the polls.

Under Article 20, any other business, a vote of thanks was given the new Moderator, James Fenton. Also a motion to see if the Town would authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the standing timber on Town Property on lots #5, 6, 10 and 16 was defeated.

After this the meeting was adjourned.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

January 29, 1970

Pelham, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Pelham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town, Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Cemetery Trustees, Library, Municipal Court and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets; December 31 1968-December 31 1969; (Exhibit A-1

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1968 and December 31, 1969 are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus decreased by \$22,285,76 from \$44,177.34 to \$21,891.58 in 1969. Inasmuch as there were no outstanding bonds or long term notes, the Balance Sheet surplus of \$21,891.58 represented the Current Surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) as of December 31, 1969.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits -3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit -4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$13,416.76, less a revenue surplus of \$3,333.43, resulted in a net Budget deficit of \$10,083.33

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1969, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1969, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Cemetery Trustees' Accounts: Exhibit F-1)

A statement of the activity in the Cemetery Trustees' Accounts for the fiscal year is presented in Exhibit F-1.

Public Library Trustees' Accounts: (Exhibit G)

The activities of the Library Accounts is presented in Exhibit G.

Municipal Court: (Exhibit H)

Cemetery Trustees' Accounts: Exhibit F-1)

A statement of the activity in the Cemetery Trustees' Accounts for the fiscal year is presented in Exhibit F-1.

Public Library Trustees' Accounts: (Exhibit G)

The activities of the Library Accounts is presented in Exhibit G.

Municipal Court: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the accounts of the Municipal Court is contained in Exhibit H.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts ject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Overdraft of appropriations amounted to \$13,416.76. Approval by the Tax Commission to expend by \$13,572.23 in excess of budgetary requirements account of winter maintenance was granted.

Tax Collector:

It is again recommended that a Tax Collector's deed should be given to the Town for all properties involved where the two year period provided by law in which redemptions from tax sales may be made has expired.

Conslusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Pelham for their assistance during the course of the audit.

REPORT OF HIGHWAY AGENT

Resealing is costing the town more money each year due to the price increase of oil, sand and machinery hired for this work, also it now takes considerable patching to prepare these roads for the process of resealing. Roads have been made wider to handle the increasing traffic, therefore, it takes more material to cover this wider area. The budget should by increased proportionately to the many new roads added to town maintenance each year and the rising cost of this work. If this is not done, then some roads will have to be scheduled for resealing every four years, rather than the three year rotation now used, This would cause these roads to deteriorate even with constant patching.

New construction was the graveling and tarring of Field Drive, Linda Ave., and Hayden Road, the graveling of St. Margaret's Lane, Simpson Pond Road, some work on Meckel Road, Pulpit Rock Road and Greeley Road, also the removal of a dangerous corner on Bush Hill Road.

The cost of winter maintenance is determined by the elements, but it costs considerably more to maintain roads that are in poor repair, narrow or in need of proper drainage which now cause repeated salting and scraping of ice huildup.

Summer maintenance consists of repairing existing roads, patching, cutting trees, adding and replacing culverts, grading shoulders and gravel roads, adding gravel and general maintenance.

REPORT OF HIGHWAY SAFETY COMMITTEE

Several meetings of the Committee were held during the year, some of these included meetings with Walter F. Mead, Coordinator of-the N.H. Highway Safety Agency.

A Federal Highway Safety Project "Dispatch Service" dispatcher and records keeper, appears as a special article in the warrant. This service can be utilized for the fire department as well as the police and possibly an aid to the Highway Department.

Other projects discussed, included the purchase of an ambulance by this same "matching funds" monies. This is a service that we will be faced with in the near future.

Mr. Meads was of the opinion if we go into these different areas, we should start with a Central Communications Center. This would provide a dispatcher for various emergency vehicles, such as ambulance, radar, civil defense, etc. Special schooling for a police officer is another service which can be taken advantage of.

These projects can continue as long as funds are available from the Federal Government. If we decide we want to have a new project we will have to pick up the total appropriation.

We feel where the town has established a Capitol Reserve Fund towards the construction of a new fire/police station, this is a step in the right direction.

In the government's consideration in granting funds for Pelham, they realized a need for this area as a result of the following conclusions:

"The Town of Pelham is located adjacent to the Massachusetts border in south central New Hampshire. As in all towns in this area, a tremendous population increase is taking place. The New Hampshire Municipal Association's statistical population report indicated Pelham has experienced a 99.6% growth factor in eight years, (2,595 more people). This represents the second highest growth rate in the county. This growth has placed intensified demands on the work of the Police Department, particularly in the area of traffic accident, surveillance, and control.

"The local department consists of a chief, three full-time officers and several special part-time officers. Two radio equipped cruisers are in operation and a base station and the telephone, as well as the headquarters, are unmanned due to thenecessity of highway patrol within the Town. This results in a citizen either calling or personally visiting the station without receiving service.

"This project envisions the employment of an individual or individuals during the regular work week to man the desk, the telephone, the base station and at the same time perform record keeping such as accident reports, summonses, reports, payrolls, filing and other required duties. The project will further provide added sums for weekend coverage and answering service during the 12 hours not covered in the regular coverage noted above.

"The program submission for the State recognizes a need for increased manpower and accelarated services at town and city levels in the function of police
traffic services. Implementation of this project will provide both of these objectives to the Town of Pelham. Access by public to police assistance will improve
as will the time allowable for highway patrol by existing officers as they are relieved of reports, typing, station duty, etc."

In closing I would like to thank the Committee for their time and effort during this past year.

REPORT OF BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Board of Adjustment meets regularly on the second Monday of each month to hear any appeals submitted. In order to be heard, the application must be in the hands of the Clerk of the Board or in the Office of the Selectmen not later than ten days before the next scheduled meeting, together with a fee of ten dollars, which is a charge for an appeal. Public notice is given in the Nashua Telegraph and posted in the Post Office and the Town Hall ten days prior to the hearing, and personal notice is sent to the applicant and to the abutters.

During 1969 twenty-two cases were posted for hearing, and \$220.00 turned over to the Treasurer as fees paid for these appeals. Of these, Fourteen cases were granted, six were denied, and no decision was found in two of the cases.

Willis Atwood acted as Chairman, Fabien Chiasson as Vice Chairman, and James Gannon as Clerk until his resignation in October. Harold Pitts was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Gannon and Charles Bernard named as Clerk of the Board for the rest of the year. Haven Strout is the other member of the Board, with Albert Nolin acting as the Selectman representative.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking materials and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

Fire Permit

A fire permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be prior to 9 a.m. and after 5 p.m.

Exceptions

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a written permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

Escaped Fires

If a fire escapes from your control, whether or not you have a permit, you are liable for the costs for control and extinguishment. If you start a fire illegally there is the additional chance of a fine. The landowner may also recover his loss or damages from the fire.

It is unlawful to drop or throw burning material in wooded areas.

Anyone seeing an uncontrolled and unattended forest fire is bound by statute to report it.

Penalties

- 1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.
- 2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500 or one year's imprisonment.
- 3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalities as in (1) above.
- 4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine is \$25

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit, Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen:

I herewith present my annual report of the activities of the Pelham Police Department from January 1, 1969 through December 31, 1969.

A sizable increase is evident over last year as the records will show.

Our population growth continues at a rapid pace. I would like to inform new residents that when registering their automobile in New Hampshire, they should also make application for an operator's license at the same time. Anyone who does not have a valid license, especially in casee of an accident, is liable to court action. I the past year, records show that some redents apparently were not aware of this requiremen.

A new law concerning motor vehicle inspections was passed by the 1969 legislaturend takes effect on April 1, 1970. Under the new law, owners of motor vehicles will be required to have their vehicles inspected during their birthdate month and every six months thereafter. A "free ride" is in effect for those per sons born in January, February or March as there will be no automatic inspetion date during 1970. Anyone who wissite have their vehicle inspected, whose birthdates fall in those months may have it done in the month that will be six months after your birthdate. However, newly registered vehicles and vehicles which have changed ownership (transferred) shall have a period of ten days from registration or transfer of ownership in which to have said vehicle inspected.

It should be pointed out that vehicles registered in corporate or business names must be inspected in April and October. If a vehicle is registered in two names, it will have to be inspected during the month of the birthdate of the first name on the registration. A leaflet describing the change in detail will be distributed by the state to all town and city clerks, chiefs of police, automobile dealers and motor vehicle inspectors.

I would like to thank the Fire Chief and his department for making available space for storage of the cruiser in their cramped quarters when not in service. A gas pump has been installed and in use by both the fire and police departments. This should show a considerable savings in the coming year.

The Police Relief Association has again made generous donations to the town. There is an item in the budget requesting a reimbursement to the association for the purchase of a new police radio pich was available on a matching funds basis. The radio is in communication with the state police and it's frequency covers the state including the motor vehicle department. I don't believe this request is unreason9e considering the equipment that they've given to the town through the years. I'ts not always possible to take advantage of the "matching funds" programs/projects at convenient times.

Bernard Flanders was appointed to the department this year to replace Sgt. Russell Corbin, who left for a position in a private industry which offered more benefits.

A new cruiser was purchased through the State of New Hampshire this past year at aconsiderablesavings. I recommend the same procedure for this year.

The Budget Committee and myself, after much discussion, have drawn up a wage scale. This will help officers greatly indetermining their plans for the future.

I'm asking for another full time officer-this meaning one full time officer at all times to work with Special Officers that may be on duty. It's impossible to keep part-time officers abreast of the daily activities of the department. Statistics show that one officer is needed for every 1000 persons. We now have four officers and our population is close to 6000 persons. Many new homes and roads necessitate extra patrol, etc.

In the event that an ambulance is needed, please make arrangements through the police to avoid possible confusion. The cruiser assists the ambulance to the area where needed. Also the police know from what direction to call an ambulance.

In this report you will also see a report from the Pelham Highway Safety Committee, concerning a police dispatching service. This is another "matching funds" program offered through the government. It is designed to aid the fire department as well as the police.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the citizens of Pelham and all branches of Town Government for the cooperation extended to this department during the past year. I have enjoyed an excellent working relationship with the Board of Selectmen.

On January 10th, 1969, I was appointed Dog Officer to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of former Dog Officer Frank C. Foisie, and at the time, I guess I didn't realize just what I was letting myself in for. With the continued growth of the town and the increase in the dog population, the calls and complaints were many and varied.

On July 10th, Charles Yerger was appointed assistant Dog Officer and between us, we received 1284 calls during the entire year;

894 nuisance calls -- trash can pickers, barking dogs, chasing cars, etc.;

122 dogs killed by motor vehicles

128 dog bites reported

140 stray dog calls -- some claimed by owners and others kept the required time and either destroyed or placed in homes, et.

I am sure that there were many more dog bites that were not reported and they, definitely, should be, regardless of how monor they may be.

I, am, also, sure that the increase in salary that I have requested for my assistant and myself, will not cover the time that will be put into this fob in the year 1970 but will be an improvement over 1969. With the new leash law, I hope that by the end of this year, the dog problem in the town of Pelham, will be like it was fifteen years ago. If your dog should stray, please contact me at 883-8008 or Officer Yerger at 635-2038 within twenty-four hours. We will be as lenient and flexible as possible in enforcing the doglaws, but we must have your full cooperation.

DOG ORDINANCE

AN ORDER

"Prohibiting dogs from running at large within the corporate limits of the town of Pelham; authorizing the impounding of dogs running at large, whether licensed or unlicensed; redemption of impounded dogs; and providing a penalty."

BE IT ORDAINED, By the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Pelham, as lows:

OTHERWISE INDICATES.

Section 1. DEFINITION OF TERMS. As used in this Order, unless the context otherwise indicates.

- (a) "Dog shall be intended to mean both male and female.
- (b) "Owner" shall be intended to mean any person or persons, firm, association or corporation owning, keeping, or harboring a dog.
- (c) "At large" shall be intended to mean off the premises of the owner and not under control of the owner or a member of his immediate family or a person of sufficient age and strength to effectively restrain the dog eithr by leash or chain, not longer than 6 feet.
- Section 2. RUNNING AT LARGE PROHIBITED. No owner or keeper of any dog shall permit such dog, whether licensed or unlicensed, to run at large within the Town of Pelham, at any time. Notwithstanding anything in this article to the contrary, no person shall be compelled to keep any dog in his possession on a leash while (1) in or upon any public street, alley, park, parkway, or her public place in the town, if at the time said dog is securely confined in an automobile, or (2) said dog is being used for legal hunting purposes, the dog being under the control of the owner or member of his immediate family and no more than three hundred (300) yards away from such owner or family member.

Section 3. IMPOUNDED, It shall be the duty of every police officer to apprehend any dog found running at large contrary to the provisions of Section 2 and to impound such dog in a suitable place.

Section 4. NOTICE TO OWNER AND REDEMPTION. If such dog has upon it the name or address of the owner, or such name or address is otherwise known then the police department shall notify the owner within twenty-four (24) hours after seizure of such dog. Notice of impounding shall be in writing, by regisyered mail postage prepaid, and shall be construed as having been given at the time of posting thereof. If the dog impounded does not have the name or address of the owner and if the owner is not otherwise known, then no notice shall be necessary. The owner of any dog so impounded may reclaim said dog upon payment of the sum of \$2.00 for each 24-hour period or any part thereof said dog is held, provided, however, that before release to any person if the dog is not licensed, a license as required by the Town of Pelham shall be secured.

Section 5 , FEES, The sum collected pursuant to the provisions of this Order shall be accounted for and paid over to the Dog Officer and/or his assistants.

Section 6. DISPOSITION OF UNCLAIMED DOGS. Any dog which has been improved and has not been redeemed by the owner shall be turned over to the nearest Animal Rescue League, provided that any such dog shall be held for at least four (4) full days after impounding and in those cases where it is required that notice be given the owner, held for at least four (4) full days after the required notice has been given.

Section 7. PENALTY. Any owner found violating any of the provisions of this order shall be guilty of a misdemeanor-and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$20.00 for such offense.

Section 8. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Order shall take effect February 1, 1970 and all Orders or parts of Orders inconsistent therewith are hereby repealed.

CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

It is my pleasure as Director of Civil Defense, to report the following activities, but first, I would like to answer a most often asked question, what is "Civil Defense." Civil Defense and local government are one and the same thing, "Civil Defense" operations occur when a local government responds to any massive emergency: - a tornado, flood, or other natural disaster, a major fire, explosion or a nuclear attack. News stories about a disaster may report that the Police cordoned off the disaster area and helped remove the injured, the fire department fought the blaze, the public works cleared away the debris and doctors treated casualties. Some people ask, yes but where was Civil Defense? The answer is that "Civil Defense" was there. It was the police, fire, public works and other forces of government dealing with the emergency, whether or not they regarded themselves as engaging in civil defense operations, or even thought of the two words, civil defense. "Civil Defense", is the concerted response to an unusual emergency condition, a response that calls for maximum use of community resources and with a greater need for coordination between emergency forces than usually exists. Civil Defense is not a special unit or group of people, standing by to save the day in case of a major disaster, Local police, fire and other forces may sometimes need some trained auxiliaries to assist the regular force in disaster operations. Some additional trained people may be needed to monitor radio active failout with special instruments or to serve as public fallout shelter managers. But the forces responsible for civil defense operations are the normal forces of government, plus non government people with needed skills, this is "Civil Defense".

During 1969, the following persons from Pelham have completed the Personal & Family Survival course at Alvirne High School, Hudson, under the supervision of Mrs. Clair D. Heath.

Other courses completed this year, thru the University of N.H. Extension Service. Civil Defense Training Program were.

Stuart W. Nash (Aux. Police) a 30 hr course in Shelter Management Instructor.

Applications are now being processed for several persons, for a home study course entitled Civil Defense U.S.A., if interested please apply.

In our continued effort to equip the Auxiliary Police Rescue truck, we purchased a Sonar, 1.8 watt portable radio on the police frequency. It may be used as a base, mobile, or portable unit when working with the Police Dept.

Another major piece of equipment acquired this year is a portable lighting unit, it consists of (2) 1000 watt Quartz unit when used with the portable alternator now in the truck, will be able to provide light at the scene of an accident, fire or any other scene where good lighting is necessary.

This year as in the past the Auxocoary Police continued to be active, they have manned the Resque truck during Holiday Celebrations, Halloween night and on several other occasions, such as fires, auto accidents, calls for flooded cellars and the use of the Porto Power. Other assignments are Church traffic duty and Court night patrols when manpower is available, or as directed by the Police Department.

If you are interestd in joining the Auxiliary, please contact Chief Boutwell for details.

The Communications Annex (RACES) conduct their exercises on Tuesday nights. This year we participated in a state wide exercise nicknamed Victor Cloud, it was a simulated nuclear attack. Its purpose, to test a communities ability to cope with such a problem, we learned much from this exercise.

Under the Warning Annex, directed by Fire Chief, Richard C. Mansfield, plans and appropriations are being made to purchase a new warning device for the Town of Pelham, our present system is old and antiquated, it does not provide the coverage which we should have, further it is on the verge of dying. To acquire a system that would give complete coverage to the Community is much too expensive at this time, our recommendations are to get a basic unit which can be added to in the future. I have been advised at C.D. Hdgtrs. in Concord, that we qualify for matching funds.

In concluding this report, may we offer our sincere thanks to all who have assisted us and donated graciously their time and effort.

LIBRARY TRUSTEE'S REPORT

In keeping with a policy of trying to update and upgrade our facilities to meet with the growing demands of the town, Mrs. Rachael Sanborn, the District Library Consultant, was asked to do an analysis and evaluation of the library. Her several visits to Pelham coincided with the installation of the new book stacks which arrived in April. This was an especially time-consuming project necessitating the removal of old shelves and the rearranging of furniture and books. The salvable old shelves are being repaired and set up in the basement and workroom for storage of books and magazines.

In addition to the necessary routine maintenance of the building, a wrought iron railing was installed on the front steps for the safety and convenience of our many patrons.

New window shades were purchased and installed. It is hoped that these will enhance the viewing quality of the many readily-attainable films from the State Library.

Because of the cut-back in Title 1 funds, the practise of pruchasing books from the State Library has been discontinued. Books must now be purchased directly from independent distributors.

The librarian and assistants received one week's vacation during the summer. The librarian once again attended classes at the University of New Hampshire.

The library is now open an additional three hours per week. The open hours are: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday 2p.m. - 5p.m.
Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday 7 p.m. - 9 p.m.
Saturday 10 a.m. - 12 noon during the school year.

The Trustees meet in the library at 7:30 p.m. the first Monday of each month.

A summer reading program was held again this year. Our children were encouraged to travel by books throughout the U.S. A. When they completed reading a book, they had the honor of pasting a state of their choice on their own U.S. MAP. All maps of about twenty-six entrants were posted on the pegboard at the right of the entrance, and the children would watch each other's travel progress. Maps, ribbons and diplomas were awarded in late August at an informal gathering held at the library.

The state-grant-in-aid of \$100 was received, and used to strengthen the reference collection.

An annual field trip was made by the Mother Goose kindergarten.

Donations by the R_{*}C_{*}A_{*} record company continues to enlarge our record collection, and due to the additional new shelves, they are now attractively displayed.

Upon the advice of Mrs. Rachel Sanborn, district consultant; the children's section of the Memorial Room was divided. This accommodates children through the sixth grade, Each group, E-three years to third grade, and J-third group through sixth grade, have a reading table and chairs. Additional shelving was added that had been stored in the workroom. The shelves are at an easily accessible height requiring no step-stool.

In the stack room, the junior high aisle is adjacent to the Memorial Room, and behind the charging desk. The next aisle is primarily the record collection, and reserves.

Many adult books labelled and separated for the high school reading lists were relabelled and added to the adult collection. This will not deprive adults of fine, old classics not necessitate duplicate books for both groups. It will also encourage the senior high reader to see, use, and expand his reading tastes into the adult collection. This results in all adult fiction and non-fiction, both old and new being located at the apposite end ofthe library from the Memorial Room-giving the mature reader better bookshelf continuity, and a quieter atmosphere for book selection.

A new filing system of registering new patrons was instituted and a re-registration of our older patrons was made. Registration blanks for children under twelve to be signed by parents were printed and distributed to the schools for library permission.

As a convenience to the patrons, post card reminders of books out are mailed monthly. Renewals may be made by phone-635-7581. A book slot is to the left of the door for the convenient return of books by patrons at any time, regardless of library hours. Book lists of new purchases are posted at the library and published in local, weekly papers.

We intend to continue a service to all age groups of the community which will enable the library to be both a recreational and educational center.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF RECREATION

To the Recreation Commission and Citizens of Pelham:

This years community sponsored Recreation Program continued to grow and provide for its residents a year-round variety of activities. The length and breadth of the program did not increase as did the number of participants. The rapid growth in population, community acceptance, and community contribution to the program attendance.

This increased growth is evident by reviewing attendance records for the past three years. In 1967, approximately 4,500 individuals attended various activities. This figure almost doubled in 1968 to 8,056. The total activity attendance figures for 1969 were 14,426--an increase of 55.5 per cent

With the growing attendance records, it has become apparent that our present community recreation facilities have become inadequate. The present community recreational opportunities are totally dependent on the availability of existing educational and private facilities. Last year, twenty-four baseball and softball teams were in operation, utilizing four school district diamonds and two private fields. Lack of adequate playing space not only provided scheduling problems for teams and individual use but overworked existing areas such athat it created a deteriation in the condition of the playing area. Our Red Cross Instructional Sqimming Program mushroomed to a point where additional swimming area was temporarily provided to accommodate the increased enrollment. The anticipated enrollment for next year will cause the swimming schedule to be extended into two, two week sessions.

Future needs for our community Recreation Program should be given priority consideration during the coming year.

Recommendations for the 1970 Recreation Program:

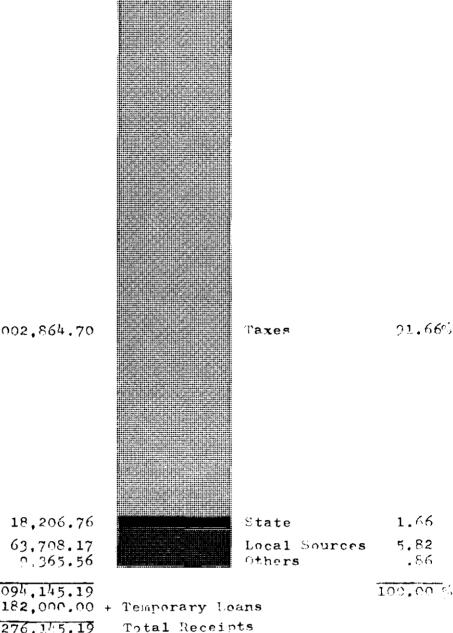
- 1. To expand the present summer program which has been evolving around the Sherburne School for the last hthree years. This expansion should establish areas where guided playground activities for pre-school and elementary school age children so that it would be available to developing neighborhoods.
- 2. To establish a Citizens' Planning Committee; in order to research neighborhood playgrounds and community parks, and to research and publish a listing of all private and public recreational activities that are available to the residents of Pelham.
 - 3. To complete the recreational inventory of all town owned land.
- $\mathbf{4}_{\bullet}$ To work with the Planning Board to establish zoning regulations for recreation.

Through careful planning and systematic investments, community recreation can keep pace and provide an adequate and attractive program for our rapidly growing community.

In conclusion, I wish to extend my appreciation to the Pelham Recreation Commission, Pelham School Board, St. Patricks Parish, Mr. and Mrs. Miles Cares, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Hamblette, and to the responsive community citizens for their contribution to recreation. The ultimate success of our program has depended on these citizens who have given so much to serve the youth of their community in a constructive and exemplary manner.

TRUST FUNDS

REPORT FROM THE NASHUA REGIONAL COMMISSION

Five communities joined the Nashua Regional Planning Commission as a result of 1969 Town Meetings. Joining the Commission already composed of Hudson, Merrimack, and the City of Nashua, were Lyndeboro, Wilton, Amherst, Hollis, and Pelham. A membership fee of fifteen cents per capita was charged for 1969 and will remain the same for 1970.

The Commission felt that its number one priority was to develop a regional plan which would then give the Commission samething to go on in reviewing proposed projects in the region, as well as qualify the member communities for an additional 10% Federal grant on sewer and water applications. The Commission hired the Institute of Research and Services, St. Anselm's College, to prepare an application for planning funds. The application was submitted to the State Planning Agency on December 22, 1969.

The Commission also reviewed six applications for Federal Grants (by Merrimack and Nashua). All applications were "approved as conforming to regional objectives."

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board holds regular meetings on the first Monday of each month; and has, in addition, held many special meetings on the third Monday of the month, in order to expedite business before the Board.

The Planning Board has adopted an agenda format for all future meetings, in order to allow more time for the preparation and review of ammendments proposed to the Zoning Ordinance, Building Regulations, and Subdivision Regulations.

Ammendments to the Zoning Ordinance are presently in the rough draft stage, and it is hoped that it will be possible to have the required hearings on these ammendments, and submit the question to the Town, prior to the 1971 Annual meeting.

Revised building regulations are in the discussion stage, and should be ready for hearings along with the Zoning Ammendments.

A rough draft of proposed ammendments to the subdivision regulations is under study by the Board, and should be ready for action by the Board within a few months.

We have requested the inclusion of an article in the warrant authorizing the Board to appoint a committee of interested citizens to assist in the preparation of ammendments to the various ordinances and regulations.

The Board has consulted several local state and federal agencies in the course of carrying on various studies in the Town, including the preparation of recommendations for the new ordinances and regulations.

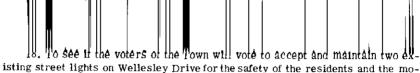

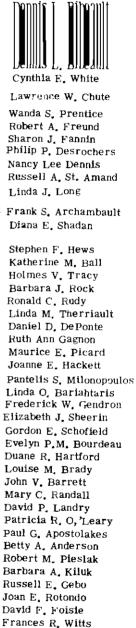

RECORD OF THE ANNUAL SCHOOL

DISTRICT MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Pelham School District was called to order by Moderator Alex Vitale at 7:40 p.m. who led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag and recessed the meeting for five minutes. Mr. Vitale resumed the business meeting at 7:45 p.m. and introduced School Board members Fred Houle, John Woodbury and Philip Currier; Budget Committee Chairman Donald Burton, School District Clerk Dorothy Hill; Superintendent of Schools Claude Leavitt and Counsel for the School District Attorney Lewis F. Soule.

Moderator Vitale asked that anyone in the hall who was not a qualified voter stand and be recognized and asked that they refrain from voting. Mr. Donald Burton was asked to come to the rostrum to explain budget items as they were taken up. Moderator Vitale referred to Article 9 of the warrant. The following action took place:

Item 110 (Administration Salaries) Mr. Houle moved that we pass over Article 1 in the warrant and take up this item under Article 9. Motion carried. Mr. Houle moved to appropriate the sum of \$1,950 which includes a raise in salary for the School Board members, School District Clerk and Treasurer and School District Moderator. Mr. Edward Perkins amended this to \$1,340 to include only the increase in salary of \$125 for the School Clerk and Treasurer. Seconded and motion carried.

Item 135 (Contracted Services) - Budget Committee figure of 4643 approved.

Item 190 (Other Expenses) - Budget Committee figure of \$590 approved.

Item 210 (Instructional Salaries) - Mr. Houle moved to appropriate the sum of \$344,330. After lengthy discussion on teacher salary increases, the need for a Librarian, an Art and Music Teacher, and extending the Remedial Reading program, Mr. Alton Hodgman asked that debate be ceased and question moved. Hearing objection, Mr. Vitale asked for a consensus of the voters. It did not receive 2/3 standing vote and more debate was allowed.

Mr. James O'Hearn amended the motion to require separate votes on three categories of the difference between the School Board budget of \$344,330 and the Budget Committee's recommended figure of \$309,330. Seconded.

Parliamentary procedure was questioned. Mr. Houle voluntarily withdrew his motion asking that he be given opportunity to resubmit items singularly following voting on three categories. Permission granted by Moderator.

A short recess was called to prepare figures for three categories.

Moderator Vitale stated he would allow three amendments on this item and asked Mr. O'Hearn to read these amendments.

- 1. To increase the Budget Committee's figure of \$309,330 by \$13,400 in order to implement the School Board salary schedule and quota of regular teachers.
- 2. To increase the Budget Committee's figure of \$309,330 by \$3,000 to increase the administrative, guidance and physical education salaries.
- 3. To increase the Budget Committee's figure of \$309,330 by \$18,600 to implement the new Librarian, an Art and Music Teacher.
- Mr. Lawrence objected to procedure and the Moderator's decision was upheld by Attorney Soule who stated the Moderator was doing what the assembly wanted.

Amendment #3 - \$309,330 plus \$18,600 - Art and Music Teacher and Librarian. Motion lost.

Amendment #2 - \$309,330 plus \$3,000 - Administrative, Guidance and Physical Education salary increases - Motion lost.

Amendment #1 - \$309,330 plus \$13,400 - Salary increases (Base of \$6,200) and 7 additional teachers - Motion passed in affirmative on a standing vote of 64 yes and 15 no.

Mr. Houle moved to appropriate the sum of 6,200 for a Librarian. Motion lost.

Mr. Miller moved to appropriate the sum of \$6,200 for an Art Teacher. Motion lost.

Parliamentary procedure was again questioned. Moderator Vitale was upheld in his decision to allow additional amendments, by Attorney Soule.

A motion was made to adjourn.

Consensus of voters was to complete this item before adjourning.

Mr. Graham asked to amend figure of \$322,730 to \$309,331.

Following more discussion, Mr. Houle moved to adjourn meeting until April 2, 1969 at 7:30 p.m. at the E. G. Sherburne School. Supported and carried.

Meeting adjourned at 11:10 p.m.

ADJOURNED SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING APRIL 2, 1969

Moderator Alex Vitale called the meeting to order at 7:45 p.m. and led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance to outlag and asked for a moment of silence in memory of General Eisenhower.

Moderator Vitale briefed the assembly on the action taken on Article 9, Item 210 at the first meeting. Mr. Vitale ruled Mr. Gaham's motion out of order and brought the amount of \$322,730 to a vote. Mr. Houle moved for reconsideration which was seconded and passed in the affirmative. Mr. Houle moved to increase the amount of \$322,730 to \$325,730, the increase of \$3,000 intended for increase of Administration salaries, The amendment carried 52 to 43. The motion carried 48 to 46. Mr. Hanlon asked for a stand of unregistered voters and asked if any had voted. They hadn't.

Item 220 - Library and Audiovisual Materials - Mrs. Corbin moved to increase the Budget Committee's figure of \$1,972 to \$2,466 for maps, globes and charts for the Sherburne School. Motion seconded and carried.

Item 230 - Teaching Supplies - Mr. Marshall moved to increase figure of \$8,966 to \$9,352 for additional art supplies. Motion seconded and carried.

Item 290 - Other Expenses - Mrs. Hince moved to increase figure of \$1,380 to \$1,410 to pay Professional Membership Fee for Guidance Counselor. This was defeated. Mr. Powers amended figure from \$1,380 to \$1,330 to delete \$50 for Principal's meetings. Amendment seconded and carried.

Item 850 - Employees Ret & FICA - Mr. Woodbury moved to increase figure to \$20,573,00 Motion seconded and carried.

Item1477.1 taken up under Article 8 in the Warrant - Mr. Fred Bischoff was asked to present his Committee's findings. The Committee recommended signing the five-year contract until Pelham's borrowing power and number of students warrant a local high school or until Windham or some other neighboring town would be interested in a co-operative venture. Following considerable debate, the article to sign the five-year contract with Hudson passed in the affirmative.

Item 1266 - taken up under Article 7 in the Warrant - Mr. Seth Marshall was asked to give a report on the findings of his committee. The article was passed in the affirmative.

Mr. Burton moved to accept total appropriation of \$937,699. Seconded and passed in the affirmative.

Article 2 - Mr. Houle moved that reports be accepted as printed in the Town Report. Seconded and passed in the affirmative.

Article 3 - Passed in the affirmative to pass over.

Article 4 - Mr. Houle moved that the Sherburne School Study Committee be commended for their work and to continue their study, working with the School Board. Seconded and passed in the affirmative.

Article 5 - Mr. Houle moved that the High School Study Committee be commended for their work and to continue their study, working with the School Board. Seconded and passed in the affirmative.

Article 6 - Mr. Fenton moved to change the date of the Annual School District Meeting to the 2nd Wednesday following the Town Meeting, An Amendment by Mr. Perkins to change the date to the 1st Wednesday in March was defeated. The motion was passed in the affirmative.

Article 10 ~ Mr. Cares moved that the Moderator be authorized to appoint a committee of an undetermined number of volunteers: one of whom he shall designate as temporary chairman until a permanent chairman shall be elected. The temporary chairman shall call the first meeting. The committee shall be instructed to investigate alternatives to the present salary system and shall make recommendations to the School Board at the Board's first meeting in December. Such recommendations shall be printed in the 1969 Annual School District Report. Seconded and passed in the affirmative.

Mr. McLlarkey moved that Donald Breck be acknowledged and recognized for his efforts on behalf of the School District. A resounding found of applause resulted.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:30 p.m.

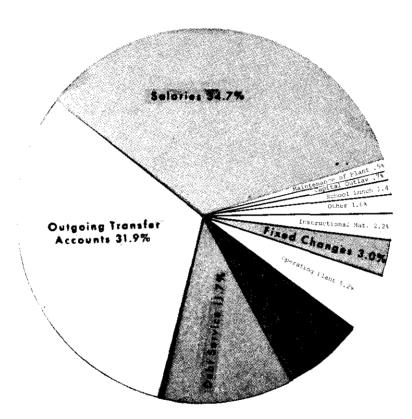

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

To the Townspeople of Pelham:

The past decade has seen rapid growth in the town of Pelham. In 1964 and 1965, we housed grades one through eight in rather crowded conditions in the E. G. Sherburne School. In September, 1966, the Pelham Memorial School opened its doors to grades five through eight and provided new educational opportunities with the inclusion of a science laboratory, language laboratory, library and a gym.

This past September, an addition to the Pelham Memorial School, which was necessary to provide for increasing enrollments, opened with a new library and proveded facilities for guidance and remedial reading. Our appreciation to the members of the Building Committee, Mr. Donald Burton, Mr. Frank Foisie, and Mr. Arthur Hanlon, for their assistance in completing this project.

The projected enrollment indicates that we will have 964 students in the School Year 1970-71. We therefore recommend, for your consideration, the warrant article requesting funds for architectural and engineering fees to provide pre-liminary plans and designs for an addition and renovations to the E. G. Sherburne School. Our appreciation to the members of the Sherburne School Study Committee and its Chairman, Mr. Seth Marshall, for their extensive study of the Sherburne School.

On June 11, 1969 the New Hampshire State Board approved the following: September 1, 1972 as the effective date for local schools to begin implementation of "Minimum Standards and Recommendations for New Hampshire Elementary Schools for School Approval, K-8".

So that our school district may meet these requirements over the next two budget years, we recommend art, music, special education and physical education teachers and a librarian be added to our school staff this year. Normal growth requires the addition of three classroom teachers. Our appreciation to Mrs. Grace O'Hearn and the women who volunteered to serve as Library Aides, for giving our students an opportunity to utilize the books in our library to increase their knowledge and reading skills.

In accordance with the recommendation of the High School Study Committee and action taken at the last school district meeting, a new five year contract providing for the tuitioning of high school students to the Alvirne High School in Hudson became effective September, 1969. Our appreciation to the members of the High School Study Committee and its Chairman, Mr. Frederick Bischoff, for their willingness to meet with neighboring communities to solve our future high school needs.

Our staffs at the E. G. Sherburne School and Pelham Memorial School continue to exhert the highest qualities on meeting the educational, nutritional and environmental needs of our young people.

To the organizations and individuals, both anonymous and acknowledged, who have contributed their time and resources to the welfare and well being of our young people, our sincere appreciation.

As we enter a new decade, we bring to you a budget, which will maintain our program of progress and quality in the education of our young people, reflecting the best thinking and reasoning of not only the board but the Superintendent and the entire staff and ask your continued cooperation and participation.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Pelham:

The completion of the Memorial School Addition is another milestone in the continuing educational story of Pelham. This facility not only doubles the capacity of the original school but offers a spacious library and a large group instructional area as well as specialized area for remedial reading and guidance. It is functional in design and complements our instructional program.

The presence of additional instructional spaces however, does not guarantee additional instructional opportunities. We find our programlacking in music, art, special education and library services. We need additional personnel to improve services in health and physical education. We require additional hardware and software to improve our existing programs in science and remedial reading. These are as integral a part of our aducational story as construction of class-rooms.

Our condition increases have been persistent and every indication suggests it will continue. In November 1968 our elementary enrollment was 782, on September 18, 1969, 866, and we project 964 for next September. We anticipate six divisions each of crades one and two and three third grade divisions will be located in the Sherburne School next year. The remaining two divisions of grade three and all pupils in grades four through eight will be housed at the Memorial School. This will utilize all classrooms available and create an automatic demand for additional classrooms for September, 1971.

Now its the time to initiate solutions to the elementary problem of 1971 as well as our high school concerns. Although we have four years remaining in a five year-high school diffion contract with Hudson now is the time to initiate long range solutions to this area of concern. Some of the meetings of the past year may bring fruition through cooperation with a neighboring school district. Pelham may choose to go it alone with its own 1 - 12 educational plan. It appears an immediate solution to the 1971 elementary problem may be an addition to the Sherburne School. However, educational solutions thereafter do not appear as clear or simple.

In conclusion I acknowledge the outstanding dedication and endless hours of work by the school board and the continued support from our staff for the continued growth and development of our children.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT

SUPERINTENDENT(PERSONNEL)

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

The following paragraphs constitute my report, as Assistant Superintendent, in charge of personnel, in the School District of Pelham, New Hampshire.

Once again during the current school year, we have had to increase the size of our professional staff in order to accommodate our growing school population. We added a total of seven professional staff members including three at the primary level and four at the middle school level. Requests for new personnel in the areas of art, music, and library did not reach fruition.

Over and above the additional personnel nine teachers left representing approximately a 25% turnover in the 1968-69 staff. The additional teachers coupled with the turnover necessitated the recruiting of sixteen new teachers. In the recruiting process we have attempted to attract new personnel from as varied a background as possible. It is our hope, that in this manner, we can develop a staff with a variety of skills and techniques representing a wide spectrum of educational theory. The following list indicates the schools represented by the sixteen new staff members:

A significant part of the total school staff are engaged in duties somewhat different from those performed by the average classroom teacher. This would seem to be an appropriate time and place to review their duties and describe the particular role that they play in the everyday operation of the schools.

At the present time Pelham employs one guidance counselor to service approximately 875 public school children and an additional 300 elementary pupils at St. Patrick's School. The function of the guidance counselor is:

- To identify each child's intellectual and personal characteristics.
- To see that each child develops to the maximum of his academic and creative growth.
- To diagnose and provide for preventative and corrective action for any learning and personality problems.

In the area of reading we employ one remedial reading specialist whose function is to work with those youngsters who are experiencing specific reading difficulties. Since mastery of the reading skills is basic to academic achievement at this level, this person fills a most critical need.

Our physical education program is staffed by one full time person. Due to increased numbers of youngsters the program has been modified to the point where the physical education instructor works directly, only with youngsters in grades 4 - 8. An additional person will be needed if the program is to include all of grades 1 - 8. The program is designed to develop strength, speed, agility, balance, coordination, flexibility, muscular endurance, good posture and body mechanics, and organic efficiency. In addition to the regular physical education program the physical educator is also responsible for the intramural and interscholastic athletic programs.

The Pelham School District also retains the part time services of a speech therapist who spends two full days per week in Pelham.

With the anticipated growth expected in September of 1971 and in order to implement those programs that will be necessary for approval under the "Minimum Standards" described in Mr. Chase's report we anticipate the need for three additional classroom teachers, an art teacher, a music teacher, a special class teacher, a librarian and an additional physical education teacher.

Through the services of our regular teaching staff coupled with the specialized skills of the various staff members previously described we hope to offer the type of comprehensive program needed to help each child realize his optimum potential. However, in the final analysis, we would emphasize that the quality of the instructional program is proportionate to the quality of the instructional staff. Every effort, both financial and otherwise, must be made to here and retain teachers of the highest calibre.

In closing I would like to thank the School Board and yourself for your direction and guidance, Mr. Kontinos and the entire school staff for their unfailing cooperation and finally the citizens of Pelhamfortheir commitment to excellence in the total educational program.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

Mr. Claude H. Leavitt Superintendent of Schools Pelham, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

The following report has been submitted in order to discuss in some detail the various curriculum aspects which I have focused my attention upon as Assistant "uperintendent of Schools of Instruction for the Pelham School District.

school year marked the completion and distribution of the "Minimum Standards and Recommendations for New Hampshire Public Elementary School Approval" as adopted by the New Hampshire State Department of Education. It is premised that if an elementary school meets these printed minimum standards an adequate program of elementary education will be provided. To this end a steady effort has been made to assess the status of the elementary schools of the Pelham School District in terms of facilities and programs and compare them to the printed minimum standards.

In terms of minimum standards Pelham School Dist4ict has a number of obvious needs which include; provisions for art and music instruction, additional secretarial and nursing personnel, formalization and outlining of curriculum areas, library personnel and facilities, additional guidance personnel, programs for the exceptional child and additional audio visual equipment. In addition it is strongly recommended (not required) by the minimum standards as well as by the Office of the Superintendent of Schools that provisions be made for the implementation of a kindergarten program in order to take advantage, to a greater degree, the formative years of a childs 1

The above needs have been recognized and budgetary provisions are being made for their eventual implementation.

Recently a study was conducted by the Office of the Superintendent of Schools relative to grade one retentions throughout Supervisory Union No. 27. Notably the study concerned itself with reasons for retentions and future methods of reducing the number of retentions. Topics of concern in the study were: grade one entrance age, affluence and its resulting affects, student sex, absenteeism, socioeconomic factors, staff stability and experience, reasons for retention, facilities in lieu of retention and predicting grade one failure.

The report indicated that Pelham School District has a grade one retention rate somewhat above the Supervisory Union No. 27 mean. The report further indicated that the Pelham Schools had little to offer as alternative to grade one retention. The report concluded that a progression of administrative and organiza-

tional steps should be pursued ultimately leading to a continuous progress program whereby no one will be retained, but everyone would continue on the academic trail in accordance with his or her capabilities. In addition each child should be subjected to a thorough physical and psychological evaluation prior to school entrance to determine their capabilities and needs.

For the first time Pelham School District has implemented a readiness and for students in need of various specialized different and individual instruction, that is not generally offered at the grade one level. Students are selected for this readiness class by means of various standardized devices in addition to staff observational ratings. It is hoped that with this smaller teacher-pupil ratio and the addition of various unique methods of instruction students will experience success and avoid the possible frustation of grade one retention.

This academic year has been marked by the constant evaluation and deliberation of various curriculum committees composed of staff members in Supervisory Union No. 27. Notably under study during this year has been the science and social studies curriculum throughout the union. Several members of the Pelham School Staff have volunteered their time and energy in order to assist these committees to a purposeful conclusion. We all well know the necessity for constant curriculum evaluation and revision particularly in the areas of Science and Social Studies which has so markedly changed in the few most recent years. Hopefully in the not to distant future a report of recommendations and a curriculum outline will be forthcoming.

REPORT OF THE SHERBURNE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The Sherburne Study Committee originated from action taken at the 1968 School District Meeting. This Committee was continued as a result of the action of the 1969 School District Meeting. The Committee's primary charge has been to examine the Sherburne School to determine the needs of the plant facilities, and to learn if the site could be used for further school expansion.

Last year this Committee asked the School District to provide monies for engineering studies to answer certain technical questions which as laymen, we could not. The sum of \$2,500 was posted by the School District for that purpose.

The School Board engaged the firm of Rollins, King and McKone to conduct the appropriate studies. In addition they were invited, by the School Board, to respond to questions this Committee formulated and submitted to the Board, upon the latter's request.

Both the listings of questions and the response from Rollins, King and Mc-Kone are attached.

Regrettably, the response given by Rollins, King and McKone does not answer the most important question put to them. That is, the request for preliminary plan indicating size and lication of a leach field for submission to the Water-Supply and Polution Control Commission. Without that office's approval of such drawings we are not yet able to report to the District whether or not further expansion can be carried out on the Sherburne site,

The remainder of the engineer's report should have amplification and clarification. This Committee has had no contact with any representative of the engineering firm despite invitations that have been extended through the Chairman of the School Board. We do not feel, therefore, that the explanations can be our responsibility.

Indeed, we too have questions we should like answered about this report. Why is an additional pump and/or well recommended for the Sherburne site in light of the Memorial School's success with less well capacity/ If the steel septic tanks are to be discontinued what credit or other write-off, if any, can be had from the remaining guarantee time on them/ Are the estimates given to be considered generalizations or working numbers/ What size boilers are being recommended? There are probably more questions that could also be asked. Suffice it to say that a more detailed engineering report is needed.

In this Committee's report last year the District's attention was brought to the expanding school population. A prediction was offered that an additional 350 students for Grades 1-4 could be anticipated over the 1969 level by 1972. The District's experience over the last year has not served to alter that prediction. There are currently 360 students in Sherburne School in Grades 1-3. With the anticipated student population expansion Grade 3 will probably have to be housed in Memorial School next year. The need for additional classroom space will exist in 1972. In order to answer that need, certain steps remain to be taken.

We recommend that School Board have appropriate preliminary drawings and soil tests for a new 500-pupil sewage system to be added on to the Sherburne site completed at the earliest possible moment, for approval by the Water Supply and Polution Control Commission.

Because of the urgency of the School District need for additional classroom space we recommend that the School Board request funds to obtain bid documents for a minimum of 12 classrooms for Grades 1-4 and the concommitant core facilities. Those documents to be prepared prior to a special School District meeting to be held in the Fall, 1970.

We urge that the School Board carry out our recommendation of last year that they obtain further land for future school development.

Finally, we recommend that the School District consider the appointment of a new Committee to work with the School Board to oversee the development of further planning for grade school development as the present Committee feels it has quite served its purpose.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Mr. Claude Leavitt Superintendent of Schools Pelham, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

It is again time to submit to you my annual report as supervising principal of the Pelham School District. Much has happened. The past year found us in the middle of a building program at the Memorial School. Amid the clamoring and clattering of machines and men, young minds still came to school eager to discover and acquire. Amid the inconveniences of the many daily disruptions, the instruction - learning process had to move forward. To allege that our school programs were not ill-affected by the building hubbub would be folly. Except for a few unfinished building tasks and equipment purchases, we have now settled once again into a daily routine that is more conducive to learning.

In our rapidly growing community, our building needs are being met in the 'Anick of time'. We can safely say that Pelham is no longer the "town" school system of the past. Our million dollars plus organization must "come of age." It must adopt more efficient and businesslike methods of operation. Time worn methods of legislating, administering and operating our schools must show change and growth commensurate with the very real and spectacular change and growth that is occurring.

Like it or not, our children's needs have also changed. Education once considered desirable has now definitely become necessary. A child's need is real! It is here! It is now!

However, we cannot overlook the fact that the citizen taxpayers also have needs. It is not always possible neither may it always be desirable, to give our children all they need, all the time. The citizens of Pelham have the burden of decision Which priorities must be satisfied? Which ones have to wait? Our schools will be only as good as the Pelham citizens want them to be - only as good as the sacrifice citizens are willing to make.

The Pelham Schools have made considerable progress during the school year. Our total curriculum offerings have been and are constantly being evaluated and revised to meet the life-centered goals and needs of our students and of the community. Our instructional efforts are being organized and our services are being coordinated to affect the best possible of utilization of existing programs, personnel and facilities.

Recommendations to fully implement programs and to initiate non-existent but necessary programs are reflected in the presented school budget. Not being an advocate of the "it's better than nothing" theory of doing things, I believe it is essential to fully fund and fully implement all initiated programs. We can justify the existance of a program only if it attains desired, educationally sound goals.

Our future efforts will continue to be directed toward the improvement of the instruction-learning process. Plans for instructional organization in grades one through four should include elements of the non-graded school, especially in the skill subjects of reading and arithmetic. However, the separate housing facilities scheduled for these grades next year creates difficult operational problems. Instructional organization in the middle school should include concepts of team teaching, core curriculum and block time scheduling.

I am most happy to report to you that Pelham is a haven for help. No assistance requested of the P.T.A., library aides, room mothers, businesses, civic social or religious organizations, and various individuals was ever turned down. Assistance came swiftly, in abundance and with magnanimity. A very special thanks from me is offered to all of them.

Our staff of teachers, special service and office personnel, lunchroom workers and custodians have all served well. They were eager and did often go that 'extra mile' when they saw it necessary.

I have enjoyed very much serving you and the people of Pelham during the past two years. You, your staff, the Pelham School Board and the citizens of Pelham are thanked for your part in granting me the matchless opportunities that have come my way.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

Mr. Claude Leavitt Superintendent of Schools Pelham, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

Following is a report of the Pelham Schools health program during the school year of 1968/69:

On September 1212th and 19th, 333 pupils received physical examinations by Luther March, M.D. All students in grades 3, 5, and 7 were examined while those in grades 2, 4 and 6 as well as 1st grade with known problems or who were new to the school district were also included. A total of 70 minor defects were found. Eight warranted private medical attention and were followed through.

In November, the State Department of Public Health held a measle clinic at the Sherburne School. Immunizations were given to 28 children.

The New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association offered TB skin testing (Heaf Test) to all first graders at Sherburne and St. Patrick's Schools on January 6. Reactions were negative in all 154 children who were tested.

A dental hygiene week sponsored by the State Dental Health Department was held here in January. Mrs. Jane Burton, State Dental Hygienist, gave individual classroom instruction to all students in grades 1 - 6.

Three State Public Health Clinics were held during April, May and June with Dr. Luther March in attendance. Immunizations administered were: Triple Toxoid (DPT) and boosters - 56, Sabin Vaccine - 29, D.T. Booster - 1 and Vaccinations - 35. Those nurses assisting were: Mrs. Anna Horskin, Mrs. Avis Fairbanks, Mrs. Georgia Atwood and Mrs. Florence Porter. Secretarial help consisted of Mrs. Frank Carleton, Mrs. Gertrude Tuttle, Mrs. Claire Hanlon and Mrs. Dorothy Constantin.

Pre-school registration was held on April 24th. First grade teachers, volunteers and nurses from Supervisory Union #27 assisted at this clinic. Dr. Luther March and Dr. Marion Fairfield were the attending physicians. One hundred and twelve children were examined this day. Mrs. Jane Burton, State Dental Hygienist, gave each child a dental examination and consulted with parents on follow-up care.

During this school year my duties, other than planning and assisting at these clinics included -

REPORT OF THE GUIDANCE COUNSELOR

Mr. Claude Leavitt Supt. of Schools Pelham School District Pelham, N.H.

Dear Mr. Leavitt:

Submitted herewith is my third annual report as guidance counselor for the school district of Pelham, New Hampshire.

PREFACE

The Guidance and Counseling Department is now in its third year of existence. As a result of constant and continuing evaluation of this program and of a reappraisal of needs, we feel that we have demonstrated the effectiveness of this program in our schools.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Testing:

The schoolwide testing program is functioning in such an efficient manner that the cost of this program has been drastically reduced.

Each incoming first grade child is now tested before he enters school in order to better assist him in his early school experience.

The counselor is now qualified to administer various individualized intelligence, projective, and readiness tests within the school setting. This saves parents the expense of paying for these tests.

We have developed a close working relationship with the Salem Mental Health Center and with Crotched Mountain in the area of diagnostic testing.

Conferences and Consultations:

Parental and Teacher conferences have more than doubled in the past year.

This department is now involved in a Supervisory Union counselor organization. A prime function of this organization is to bring in consultants to discuss the availability of resources for the more efficient functioning of this department.

The counselor is a member of a Salem Mental Center committee whose function is to assist in helping to diagnose and treat children with learning disabilities.

This department hosted a conference on children with "Specific Learning Disabilities" in which more than fifty educators were in attendance.



With the assistance of Title 1 advice and equipment, we have begun a pilot program to assist children with reading disabilities.

With the assistance of the School Nurse, we are going to conduct a study into the reasons why certain children exhibit a tendency to be ill more than other children.

Counseling:

This is the most difficult area to evaluate in a public forum because it is impossible to cite specific case histories. The success of this program can only be shown by saying that it is impossible to keep up with the workload of parental, teacher, and self-referrals. For while the caseload constantly increases, the number of personnel in this department remains constant.

RECOMMENDATIONS

This department recently completed a survey of the needs for special education in the Pelham Schools, It is hoped that this study will merit close consideration.

Our readiness room is now in its first year of existence. We are fortunate in having an excellent teacher for this room. We feel that at least one more readiness room is essential for the number of children entering our schools.

We plan to continue to implement a plan of pupil personnel services more effectively utilize the various resource personnel within our schools in assisting our children. The counselor is taking a course at U. N. H. in this area.

Because of the constantly increasing workload, we feel that the addition of one more qualified school counselor is essential to maintain the high standards which we have implemented.

Because of the opportunity presented by the people of Pelham for the counselor to attend two conferences or group procedures, we are implementing group counseling in the schools.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the people of Pelham for the beautiful suite of offices provided for us in the new wing of the Memorial School.

In closing, we wish to thank you Mr. Leavitt, Mr. Dolloff, Mr. Chase, Mr. Kontinos, Sr. Gregory, the staffs of all the schools, the School Board, and the people of Pelham for the support and cooperation so generously and freely given this past year.

LUNCH PROGRAM REPORT

Mr. Claude Leavitt Superintendent of Schools Pelham, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Leavitts

In the early days of our lunch program, the P.T.A. organized volunteers and with Mrs. Horshin, the school nurse, and often only with a kettle of soup, prepared in a nearby kitchen, they heated and served from the stove in a one-room school. What a great step forward our school lunch has taken since 1950 in helping to build stronger bodies for better learning.

Let's compare only a few of the figures over the last ten years. In 1958 and '59, we served 17,643 meals to children and 1,038 to adults with an enrollment of 432 pupils. Last year we served 86,754 meals to pupils and 3,652 to adults, and purchased 128,527 and 1/2 pints of milk for an enrollment of 840. In 1959, the federal reimbursement for milk was \$732,83 and on food \$2,282,49 while last year we received a reimbursement of \$5,515,07 and food valued at \$6,690,85. That is only a small picture of the financial growth of the program. We have grown labor wise from one paid worker and volunteers to five full and four part time workers. We now operate a central kitchen for cooking and carry-out service to Sherburne School. During this growth, we have had our ups and downs, but always with the continued support of the townspeople, so that now we can boast of a lunch program ranking in the second largest group participation in the state (500-1000 daily).

Many thanks to the volunteers who continue to help out with picnics, Thanks-giving dinner, etc. Our list has grown to include Dorothy Constantin, Pauline Kopacz, Ginger Newcomb, Irene McElroy, Lu Haldeman, Beverly Hayes, Marietta Potter, Georgia Atwood, Ruth Brock, Joanne Edwards, Phyllis Robertson, ackie Simpson, Mildred Lynch, Barbara Vitale and Phyllis Hogue.

The cafeteria staff continues their efforts on the theory "it's not the hours that one puts in but what one puts into the hours that counts."

I should like to thank the School Board, Superintendent and Office Staff as well as the entire staff for their interest and cooperation in the service to our customers.

What is a customer in our program? Our customer is the school child, and he is the most important person in our business. Our Customer is never an interruption in our work - he is the purpose of it. We are not doing him a favor by serving him - he is doing us a favor by giving us the opportunity to serve him. Our Customer is never dependent upon us - we are dependent upon him. Our Customer is not an outsider in our business - he is part of it.

Our Customer is a person who brings us his wants. It is our job to handle them profitably for him.

Our Customer is the life blood of the school lunch program and is deserving of the best treatment we can give him through his formidable years.

This committee has met with the Windham School Board to further explore this matter and it appears that there is a real possibility for the formation of a coooerative high school between the towns of Pelham and Windham (and possibly Litchfield). At the time of the writing of this report, the committee is waiting for word from Windham concerning the organization of their High School Study Group.

We have been assured of the formation of this group and will be discussing the high school problem with them prior to the School District Meeting, at which time any positive results of these talks will be reported.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board, School District Treasurer and the School Lunch Program Account.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1968 and June 30, 1969, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt of the School District increased by \$323,505.71 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1969.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibit C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30. 1969, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$29,207.20, plus a revenue surplus of \$3,551.84, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$32,759.04.

Classified Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1969, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1969, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Building Fund Accounts: (Exhibits G-1 & G-2)

Statements of the Building Fund Accounts for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1969, are presented in Exhibits G-1 and G-2.

School Lunch Program Account: (Exhibit H)

Exhibit H presents a statement of the School Lunch Program Account for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1969.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the School Tax Account with the Town of Pelham is presented in Exhibit I. As indicated therein, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1968-69 School Tax of \$670,656.10, plus an overpayment of \$38,279.33 on account of the 1969-70 School Tax. This overpayment is shown as a liability on the Balance Sheet at June 30, 1969.

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1969, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit J_{\star}

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$6,505.71, from \$39,264.75 to \$32,759.04, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1969, as shown herewith:
