STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pelham, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see what disposition the Town will make of the dog fund for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see what disposition the Town will make of the literary fund for the ensuing year.
- 5. To choose two persons for Trustees of Cemeteries for three years.

- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for school purposes for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.
- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year and determine in what manuer the same shall be expended.
- 9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise to pay on Town debt the ensuing year.
- 10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Cemeteries for the ensuing year.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to prepare a Town highway map as specified in Chapter 133, Sec. 3, of Laws passed January session, 1903, provided such map should be called for by the State Engineer, and if voted in the affirmative to appropriate money therefor.
- 12. To choose one person for trustee of Public Library for three years.
- 13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 14. To see how much money the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent. on taxes of 1904 list, paid on or before September 1, 1904.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to build a receiving tomb, and if voted in the affirmative to appropriate money and choose Agents to carry the same into effect.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to repair and paint the Town House, and if voted in the affirmative to appropriate money to carry the same into effect.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Australian Ballot system at the next annual Town Meeting.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOLS.

With every passing year we need to be more in dead earnest about all educational work.

Progress is in the air and it pertains to all grades even the lowest primary. There must be a good foundation or the superstructure suffers.

More than this, there should be harmony of plan through all grades beginning with the primary and including the High School.

We can no longer estimate a pupil's standing by the size of the arithmetic through which he has ciphered, the geography and the history he has been over. The question is, can he write legibly—never mind the copy-book—but can he write legibly; can he spell correctly; does he use good english, both in writing and speaking; can he add, subtract, multiply and divide rapidly and without mistake; when called upon in the class-room, does he rise to his feet, stand self-possessed and make a clear and correct statement, make it with good enunciation and with a volume of voice and quality of tone, that is not only agreeable to the ear, but such as will make what he says unmistakably understood.

If he can do these things, the foundations are

well laid, no matter what he has studied or has not studied.

It is only a small percentage of the great work of education that is in the hands of the teacher.

What the teacher is able to do for the pupil depends largely upon the kind of outside influences that surround the pupil, physical, mental and moral.

The present season has been a very hard one for the schools. The weather and illness have caused great irregularity of attendance. The absence of a pupil is a great drag upon a school.

It is more of a hindrance to good results than can be estimated. There is not sufficient thought given to this matter. For a member of a school to be absent without sufficient reason, and there are few reasons sufficient save illness, thermometer below zero, or impassible roads, is a wrong to the school, a wrong that comes very near being a crime.

Inexcusable absences are constantly occurring. This fault should be corrected. In educational interests, as in every other, it must not be "each for himself" but each for the interest of every other concerned.

At the present time we have an unusually good set of children in the schools, well-behaved and lovable, almost without exception.

We have very faithful teachers, and they have excellent material on which to work.

School No. 1.—First term, 26 scholars; second, 18; third, 19; for the year, 41—21 boys and 20 girls. Average attendance, 17.

All attended to reading, spelling, penmanship and arithmetic; 25 to drawing, 35 to geography, 28 to grammar, 13 to history, 25 to composition, 6 to algebra and 25 to botany.

School No. 2.—First term, 18 scholars; second, 15; third 16; for the year, 28—16 boys and 12 girls. Average attendance, 14.

All attended to reading, spelling, penmanship, arithmetic, drawing and vocal music; 20 to geography, 20 to grammar, 18 to history, 27 to physiology, 8 to algebra and 20 to composition.

School No. 3.—First term, 29 scholars; second, 27; third, 21; for the year, 31—13 boys and 18 girls. Average attendance, 21.

All attended to reading, spelling, penmanship, arithmetic and vocal music; 25 to geography, 17 to grammar, 17 to history and physiology, 4 to algebra, 17 to composition, 2 to book-keeping, 17 to botany.

School No. 4.—First term, 20 scholars; second, 22; third, 20; for the year, 27—14 boys and 13 girls. Average attendance, 16.

All attended to reading, spelling, penmanship, arithmetic, drawing and vocal music; 15 to geography, 11 to grammar, 6 to history and 15 to composition.

School No. 5.—First term, 17 scholars; second, 17; third, 16; for the year, 17—9 boys and 8 girls. Average attendance, 14.

TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

PELHAM FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

TRUSTEES' REPORT.

The year ending with the issuing of this report has been one highly satisfactory as regards the affairs of the library. There has been a steady growth in the number of books, and the benefits of a free public library are getting to be more and more realized and appreciated by the people of the town, as evidenced by the marked increase in circulation the past year.

Besides the gifts of many books to the library, one hundred dollars' worth of books have been added by the trustees, which was quite an increase over the number purchased last year and we hope even more volumes may be added the coming year. The trustees take this opportunity to publicly but impersonally extend their thanks to all who have aided us by the gift of books or otherwise, and we are sure the public are grateful for their generosity and duly appreciate the gift.

Perhaps one hundred and fifty dollars is as much as the town feels that it can afford to appropriate annually for the support of the library, but if the amount could be raised to two hundred dollars it would not appear unwise, and we feel confident that it would be money well expended. As the library grows the expenses will necessarily be slightly increased, and we do not want to fall behind in the number of books added each year. We all feel proud of our library, as we justly should; we all wish to see it prosper, as it has prospered in the past; and we would each one of us feel disappointed to see any backward step.

The salary of the librarian has been advanced from thirty to forty dollars per year because of the increase in her duties occasioned by the larger number of books to be handled, catalogued and arranged. The trustees wish to extend to her their thanks for her faithful and efficient work for the past year, and express the wish that she will continue to serve the library in her present capacity.

The trustees were more fortunate than usual this year in having more book lists handed in than in any preceding year, which helped us very much in making up our list of books to purchase. As the field of literature is enlarging year by year, it becomes more difficult, among so many books, to choose suitable ones for our library; for many of them are of only indifferent merit, while some are

positively bad. When the worthless and indifferent books are eliminated there remain only a few good ones, and these are what we want. In making up our list of books to be purchased each year, we endeavor to get a well-balanced selection. While books of fiction predominate, we get, each time a few books of more substantial reading. It is fiction that is most demanded, and we venture to say that nine out of every ten books taken from the library are fiction. This class of literature seems to appeal peculiarly to the average American mind. Good fiction is not, as many seem to think, altogether unprofitable reading.

A list of books added during the past year will be published, as usual, in the town report.

With the library no longer an experiment, but already an assured success, we feel confident in predicting its steady growth and increasing usefulness.
