You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Pelham, on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart for town maintenance of highways and bridges. $P \gtrsim 3.50$
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500 for snow removal or take any other action relating thereto. γ
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department for the ensuing year. 4
- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department for the ensuing year. 4
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise \$240 for street lighting for the ensuing year or take any other action relative thereto.
- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the aid of the Town Poor for the ensuing year.
- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.
- 10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries for the ensuing year.
- 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100 for dishes and furnishings for the Town Hall to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen.

13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on the town debt. 91433 it was given by

14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to bond the town for a sum sufficient to cover the unauthorized town debt or take any other action relative thereto.

- 15. To see if the town will vote to close (subject to gates and bars) a portion of Tower Hill road so called leading from the highway between the Mansfield and Coleman residences and extending towards the entrance to the Jeremy Hill Lookout Station.
- 16. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under laws of 1933, Chapter 99, Section 22.

AUDITORS' REPORT

We, the undersigned auditors of the town of Pelham, certify that we have examined the books of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Treasurer of Trust Funds, and Treasurer of Cemetery Trustees. We find the Selectmen have issued orders on the Treasurer to the amount of \$49,353.55, and said orders were properly receipted. That the Treasurer has received from various sources \$50,710.17 and has paid the above mentioned orders, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$1,356.62. The collector has \$7,630.85 of the 1933 taxes to collect. The Town Clerk has paid the Treasurer \$946.42 for auto permits of which \$226.55 was for 1933 permits and \$719.87 for 1934 permits. He has paid the Treasurer \$240.80 for dog licenses. The Treasurer of the Trust Funds has a balance on hand \$829.25 including interest of \$76.70. The total amount of trust funds is \$8,642.50. Interest on Amoskeag Bank books not drawn \$42.01. The Treasurer of the Cemetery Trustees has a balance of \$5.47.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Hudson, N. H., Feb. 1, 1934.

To the School Board and Citizens of the Town of Pelham:

Following is my fourth annual report as superintendent of your schools.

The enrollment in the schools on January 2, 1934 was as follows:

September, 1933, found the same teaching staff in Pelham which was there last year, and these teachers are continuing their efficient work during the present school year.

At the present time, there are thirty more pupils in the schools in Pelham than there were a year ago. This has meant in many cases, that complete sets of books have had to be purchased for this added enrollment; but even with the increased enrollment, it has been possible to provide our book and supply needs without asking for additional funds.

I believe that the music supervision in Pelham during the past two years has afforded to the boys and girls an opportunity to get a good start in the fundamentals of music.

The operetta by the children of the elementary schools, originally planned for December 15, has been postponed until April because of contagious illness among the school children.

Prompt and regular attendance in school is essential for each child if he is to do his best work. Irregular attendance not only handicaps the individual absent, but it retards the work of the rest of the class when that individual returns unprepared to go ahead with the regular advance work.

Pelham Center is the natural center of the town, and I believe it a wise move by the parents of the town in organizing one central Parent-Teacher Association to take the place of the several already started. The Parent-Teacher Association as now organized is prepared to keep in touch with the educational policies, the advantages and the opportunities of the Pelham school

During the last year, several people have talked with me in regard to the possibility of having one consolidated school in Pelham. I believe that the geographical lay-out of the town lends itself very favorably to one centralized school located at the present junior high school. With the present school population in the lower grades, the first six grades could be conducted with one or two fewer teachers than there are at the present time. The school would then be organized in groups of two grades to a room, thus giving each teacher fewer classes, and enabling her to concentrate upon the work of two grades.

It does seem to me that consolidation this next year is not advisable, but since there is some talk in regard to the matter, it seems to be an opportune time to study the advantages and possi-

bilities of consolidation.

I suggest that the school meeting appoint a committee consising of the school board and two other members to gather information to work out a plan of consolidation, and report at the

1935 school district meeting.

If the five rural schools in Pelham are to be maintained several more years there are improvements which must be made; but if through consolidation these schools are to be closed, it seems useless to make these improvements.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER

Pelham, N. H., Feb. 1, 1934.

To Supertintendent Fred W. Hall, the Pelham School Board, and Citizens of Pelham:

Herewith is submitted the annual report of Pelham High School.

The school year opened with an enrollment of nineteen, a substantial increase in registration over that of last year. At present, there are seven pupils in grade 10, and eleven pupils in grade 9.

The curriculum for 1933-34 follows, the courses being the usual alternates with the curriculum of last year:

English I	40 min. per., 5 days per week
French IX-X (elective)	40 min. per., 5 days per week
Jr. Business Training (elective)	40 min. per., 5 days per week
Social Science	40 min. per., 5 days per week
General Science	40 min. per., 5 days per week
Fundamentals	20 min. per., 3 days per week

Due to constant and careful supervision by the school nurse, the high school attendance has suffered little, in spite of the prevalance of various acute forms of illness in the early winter. Faithful attendance is an essential of good scholarship. Figured in terms of state average, the attendance has been very good. We thank the parents for their insistance upon prompt and constant attendance.

For extra-curricula activities this year we have the Literary and Nature Clubs, and later in the year we will have the annual school play and Spring outing.

As an adjunct to the school work in English we are introducing this year, work in Public Speaking. A Public Speaking contest was held on January 26.

Laboratory equipment for General Science has been purchased this year. This will enable us to extend our experimental work, and thus greatly increase the value of this course.

The teachers of the High School wish to thank the Superintendent of Schools, the members of the school board, and all who have helped to make this last year a success.

In May, Dr. Ralph W. Parker gave toxoid to seventy-five school children under the auspices of the State Board of Health.

In June Dr. Ralph W. Parker vaccinated seventeen children,

most of whom were to enter school in September.

We were fortunate in being able to have Dr. Robert B. Kerr of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association examine fifty-seven children in November. All defects found were reported to the parents.

Your nurse has distributed cod liver oil to school children, under the direction of the State Board of Education and the New

Hampshire Relief Administration.

The milk furnished by the Relief Administration has been much appreciated and the clothing distributed by the Red Cross has added much to the comfort and appearance of the children.

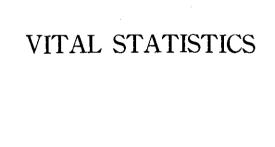
